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

KIMBERLY & KRAK ARNTSON • OLYMPIC VALLEY, CA CONNER'S CREW



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Through the Eyes of...

I recently had the pleasure of sitting down with past Commodore R. Randolph Walker to discuss the history of the Tahoe Yacht Club. Randy, as he is known to his friends, has contributed much to the oral and written history of the club, having essentially been born into it in 1933.

andy, as he is known to his friends, has contributed much to the oral and written history of the club, having essentially been born into it in 1933. He completed an article, "A Club on Lake Tahoe," for the Block & Tackle at the turn of this century that provided comprehensive details for the club's 85th anniversary article. That article, compiled by TYC editor Owen Korsmo, also drew extensively from former Lake Tahoe and TYC historian Carol Van Etten's book, "Lake Champions: In Pursuit of Tahoe's Racing Title, 1914-1958."

The Power Boating section of our own website touches upon the formation of the club in 1925 by the

"well heeled" San Francisco families who returned year after year to enjoy "Lake Tahoe's sapphire waters and the surrounding pine-covered mountains." As I dug into the considerable club documents provided by Randy, I became fascinated by the events and particularly the people who contributed to the evolution of our lake. I discovered a progression in which the establishment of our club proves integral to the very character of the lake and what it's become today.

Thus we begin what I hope will be a series of articles, inspired by conversations with and the recollections of our own Tahoe Yacht Club members. Through their eyes, I will share with you the circumstances and personalities that founded the Tahoe Power Boat Club, how our club helped shape the lake, and our emergence and the maturation of the Tahoe Yacht Club that we currently enjoy. Let's start with an investigation into the people who initially arrived to take advantage of the lake's invaluable resources, and the factors that determined the earliest residences, resorts, and nascent maritime disposition.

THE FIRST SETTLERS

For 6000 years, the Native American Washoe (transliterated in older literature as Wa She Shu) people hunted and gathered in the Great Basin whose western border is formed by the Sierra Nevada mountain range. The area around Lake Tahoe remained pristine until the 1848 California Gold Rush brought the first European explorers to the region.

The frontiersmen anglicized the Washoe name "Da-ow-a-ga (edge of the lake)" to "Ta-ho," however the current name was not officially adopted for many years. In 1852, John Bigler, the third governor of California, led a rescue party from Placerville over Echo Summit to save a group of snowbound emigrants. Through the latter half of the 19th century, the name was officially known as Lake Bigler even while most surveys and the general public knew it as Lake Tahoe. Controversy arose during the Civil War, when Union advocates objected to the association with Bigler, who was an ardent secessionist. Politicians began lobbying for a change of name, which was not made official until 1945.

THE MINING ERA

Those early days of modern settlement materialized in support of the Comstock mining efforts in Virginia City, Nevada. Throughout the 1860s, the area was developed to provide hay and grains grown in the meadowlands while the forests were exploited for their substantial timber. In 1862, gentlemen by the names of Fish, Ferguson, Smith, and Coggins settled on federal lands in Squaw Valley, calling their meadowland section Squaw Valley Ranch. Without our current highways, boats were the primary mode of transporting their goods around the lake to the south shore lumber operations. Harnessing the power of the wind, the men built the 60 foot, double-masted "Iron Duke" near present day Tahoe City. The ship was capable of carrying over \$30,000 worth of hay and grains to Lapham's Landing or the Lakehouse Fishery Wharf on the southeast shore of the lake, a considerable fortune in those days, but desperately needed to feed the animals headed over Kingsbury Grade to the Comstock Lode. The "Iron Duke" is known as the first sailing vessel on the lake, but she was soon replaced by the more reliable steamers, which didn't have to contend with the fickle nature of alpine winds. It would take over 50 years for a former Norwegian Navy sailor and Tahoe Yacht Club member named Rusty Rustadt to bring sailing back to the lake.

By the mid 1860s, the lake became recognized as a resort destination. The California Gold Rush had inspired heavy migration to the west. As

access to the lake improved, settlements began popping up. Our original mountain man, John Washington McKinney, was inspired by what he claimed be the finest hunting and fishing camp in the Sierra Nevada. He founded his Hunter's Retreat in 1863, and the part of Lake Tahoe by Homewood and Tahoma later became known as McKinney Bay. Through bad luck and poor business acumen, McKinney lost the retreat in 1892 to William Westhoff, a "spirits drummer" from Sacramento, over a \$600 whisky debt. Meanwhile, Yank Clement moved from Meyers in 1875 to build a place at the southwest corner of the lake, offering a store, cabins, complete livery accommodations and even a dance floor mounted on springs. Around the corner, stagecoach magnate Ben Holladay built his estate at Emerald Bay.

In 1863, the south end of the lake saw its first resort hotel. Founded at Glenbrook, the vacation spot for the leisured aristocracy of the booming Comstock was conveniently located at the head of the new turnpike to Carson City. In the 1880s, E.J. "Lucky" Baldwin, the legendary financier of the Comstock, bought the northwestern portion Clement's holdings, altered the original building, and opened the Tallac Hotel. By the late 1860s, McKinney had created a resort with 20 cabins and a number of tents. According to public records, the place now recognized as Tahoe City was also surveyed at this time. It was recorded by W. Taft on August 8, 1863, although significant development would wait for several years.

Around that time business was booming. Development and commerce continued, along with the emergence of many support industries. Timber harvesting continued to expand, with new innovations to quickly transport resources to Virginia City.

Early pioneers, brothers Thomas and John Elliot, created the Summit Fluming Company to support Comstock development. They were bought out in 1873 by the Carson Tahoe Lumber and Fluming Company. Their V-flumes, a local invention by J. W. Haines, revolutionized the transportation of lumber and cordwood from high elevations to low. It reached the zenith of its operations in the mid-1870's and, with the exhaustion of the Comstock load, finally closed its books in 1898. Duane LeRoy Bliss, a former member of the Virginia City branch of the Bank of California, Henry Yerington, construction superintendent of the Virginia

and Truckee Railroad plus Darius Ogden Mills were the gentlemen who put together the Carson and Tahoe Lumber and Fluming Company.

Fishermen began to exploit the lake's resources, shipping trout by rail from Truckee to the Comstock and as far away as the east coast at fifteen cents a pound. As early as 1880 there were signs of obvious decline in native trout, affected both by commercial fishermen and by the effect of the logging and sawmill operations on the spawning creeks, which became choked with sawdust, slash, and other debris. Timber stands were exhausted by the mid 1890's and mining on the Cornstock had greatly slackened by 1896. By that year, 47,000 acres of timber had been cut and barely 950 acres of usable pine stands remained. During 28 years of logging activity, an estimated 750,000,000 board feet of lumber and

500,000 cords of wood had been harvested. Truly, in the words of Dan DeQuille, "the Comstock lode was the tomb of the forests of Tahoe." All lumbering operations closed down in 1898 and the Bliss family (now sole owners) hastened to form a new corporation, the Lake Tahoe Railway and Transportation Company.

In 1898, Bliss began to construct a railroad that would connect Tahoe with Central Pacific's standard gauge line at Truckee. Rolling stock for

the new railroad had been barged over to Tahoe City from abandoned lines in Glenbrook and Bijou. The laying of track on the new 15-mile roadbed continued through the summer of 1899, and in the spring of 1900, the line was put into tentative operation. The elegant new Grand Central Hotel was erected at Tahoe City, and San Francisco businessman Isaias Wolf Hellman began buying property at Sugar Pine Point. George P. Tallant, guiding light of San Francisco's Crocker Bank and an avid fisherman, built a home situated between Emerald Bay and Camp Richardson. He later sold the property to Lloyd Tevis, director and later president of Wells Fargo Bank.

In 1899, conversion of the milling center to a recreation complex was begun at Glenbrook Bay. The complex was to include two summer resorts, a scenic narrow-gauge railroad and total of four excursion steamers on Lake Tahoe. Scrap material from the milling complex was used to maximum advantage. It was during this transition period that Lake Shore House was incorporated with other existing buildings and moved to form the Glenbrook Inn. As the 19th century winds down, Lake Tahoe has shifted its focus entirely from mining to recreation.

PLAYGROUND OF THE RICH AND FAMOUS

At the turn of the 20th century, resort building and tourism began in earnest. D.L. Bliss. manager of the new rail line, ran the first train for the 1901 summer season into Truckee from Tahoe City. The 15-mile trip took several days, owing to slight repairs en route and the diversion of snow waters from the track. However, the road was reported in excellent condition, and regular trips were scheduled to begin after May 15.

As the first tourists began arriving from the San Francisco Bay Area, construction began on the Tahoe Tavern. It was designed by Walter Danforth Bliss, who was also working on Hellman's Pine Lodge estate at Sugar Pine Point. Continuous improvements on Tahoe Tavern through 1907 included steam-generated power and water systems that were necessary to provide a self-supporting infrastructure for its flood of visitors. Meanwhile, Pine Lodge was completed. It was later inherited by I. W. Hellman's daughter, Florence Hellman Ehrman, and her husband, Sydney and came to be known as the Hellman-Ehrman Mansion.

William S. Tevis, who inherited the Tallant property from his father, began development of his grand residence and grounds south of Emerald Bay.

As recreation increased at the lake, inhabitants began to recognize its natural value. During the 1912, 1913 and 1918 congressional sessions representatives tried unsuccessfully to designate the basin as a national park. Commercial fishing was finally outlawed in 1917. By then the lake,

once teeming with native aquatic species, had been radically impacted.

By the time the Roaring Twenties arrived, Tahoe was well established as the playground for San Francisco's social elite. David Henry Chambers purchased McKinney's resort from the Westhoffs and renamed it Chambers Lodge. George A. Pope, Sr. acquired the Tevis property and named his 38 acre playground "Vatican Lodge" - an obvious pun on his surname. San Francisco investment broker and Tahoe Power Boat Club member Walter S. Heller purchased the land south of the Pope estate. Heller began construction of what would become the last great Tallac mansion, an impressive stone and wood lodge he called "Valhalla."

Boating activities grew with the surfeit of resorts. The majority of boats still served commercial and industrial purposes, but that didn't stop thrill seekers from using them for competition. The S.S. Meteor, which operated on Lake Tahoe between 1876 and 1939, was once known as the


fastest boat on the continent running at an amazing 20mph. Wealthy residents purchased elegant wooden sedans to transport themselves and their guests. Sidney Ehrman, a prominent San Francisco attorney and husband of Florence Hellman Ehrman, commissioned the construction of "Comet" in 1922 out of the San Pedro, California boatyard of Fellows & Stewart. Playboy Walter Scott Hobart Jr, who had inherited his wealth from his lumber magnate father, squandered his fortunes on his lavish Sand Harbor resort and fast boats. His Quic-chakidn cruiser (known more simply as "Q") was commissioned in 1921 and used to ferry socialites and silent movie stars until it was commandeered during WWII by the US Navy for secret wartime experiments. Lodi rancher Elliot Edmund Morses first brought his 26-ft. Stephens Brothers, the Florence M II, to Lake Tahoe in 1925. Although already reputed as a fast boat, it was quickly modified by Morses' daughter, Mrs. Evelyn Morse Skinner, for competition against the sleek Gar Wood and Chris-Craft boats. Automotive designer Norman DeVaux specially ordered a Hacker Gentlemans Race Boat, housing a 400 horsepower Liberty V12 Aircraft engine. The boat was custom designed by John L. Hacker as the Apache II and featured a 29-foot Gold Cup type hull. DeVaux raced Apache II during the 1920s and 1930s at Lake Tahoe, taking home several wins.

Visitors began flooding in. At that time, you could travel to Truckee on the mainline railroad, and for only \$1.50 transfer to the narrow gauge line and travel to the Tavern in Tahoe City. You would ride the passenger car, which was behind the ever-present freight cars. After dropping its passengers at the Tavern station, the train would go out on the long Tavern pier to meet the Steamer "Tahoe", which made the daily mail run around the lake in eight hours. As a point of comparison, my husband's best time around the lake on his bicycle is only 3 and a half hours! The boats were still the most efficient way to get around the lake, and many competitive lads took to arranging informal races between them.



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
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
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North Tahoe Rowing Regatta



a Monday event as part of the Concours d'Elegance

The Concours d'Elegance will once again be held at Obexer's Boat Company this year beginning on Friday, August 12th. On Monday, August 15th, the Tahoe Yacht Club (TYC) will sponsor the Wooden Boat Week Over-the-Bottom rally. This popular Woody Over-the-Bottom event has been held for more than 25 years, and is now open to the Lake Tahoe boating community. Lake Tahoe boaters may join and experience this new found entertainment along with the Concours' wooden boat participants and many of the TYC members. All power boats are welcome; non-wooden boats will run the same course, starting directly following the wooden boats. There will be separate trophies for each of these two divisions. Awards will be presented at the TYC Clubhouse, next to the Tahoe City Marina, during a light brunch celebration following the race at approximately 10:30am. The event should wrap up by noon. The rally will cost \$40 per boat, and the Brunch is anticipated to be \$25 per person.

HOW DOES AN OTB WORK?

All TYC power boaters are encouraged to participate in the OTBs. All types of power craft – wood, fiberglass, or metal – can participate. No specialized equipment is required, and speeds are not excessive. Many skippers believe that both a GPS and a stop watch are useful. History has proved that a successful performance in an OTB requires limited navigational knowledge, some boat handling skills and most importantly

a whole lot of luck! Typically there are 15 to 25 boats participating in an OTB even, but the more the better. Some skippers have participated single handed, but most find one or two additional crew to be helpful. It is up to the skipper as to how many additional passengers participate. Remember, in addition to being challenging, the event is intended to be fun!

At the morning registration before each event, skippers and crew receive printed instructions to follow a prescribed course including direction, speed and timing. Each boat attempts to follow the same course, departing at one minute intervals, with the objective to match the mark time set by the TYC staff in the club's mark boat. Along the course there are multiple check points where the crew will pick up a playing card, which is used to form a poker hand at the end of the rally. The Season Series winner is determined after the final event, based on each participant's gross cumulative time off the mark time for their best 3 of 5 events.

To summarize, power boaters, we want you! Are you tired of the restaurant runs and slow cruises around the Lake? Join your friends at the Tahoe Yacht Club for an exciting adventure using your power boat in an Over-the-Bottom Season Series event. Members without a power boat are welcome, too. We will even help you get started. Ride along with an experienced OTB'er, or invite an experienced OTB'er to ride along in your boat for an event.

TRANS TAHOE 2016 BY JIM MULLEN

The Tahoe Yacht Club will host its premier sailboat racing event, the Trans Tahoe, over the weekend of July 8-10 2016. This open-competition regatta will be for keelboats 20-feet or more and to multi-hull boats 20-feet or more. Competitors may register at the TYC Web site, www.tahoeyc.com or in person at the TYC clubhouse.

The main event for the weekend is the Trans Tahoe Race, which starts in the waters off the Yacht Club in Tahoe City and proceeds around buoys off Eagle Rock, Sugar Pine Point, Deadman's Point (near Glenbrook), Sugar Pine Point, and Tahoe City. Other events include a luncheon and awards ceremony on at 1200 Sunday, July 10 at the TYC clubhouse and a practice race at 1700 on Friday July 8.



Spectators are welcome to come out to the starting line and other racecourse locations to watch the action. Start time is 1200 Saturday July 9, although the race committee may postpone the start depending on wind and other weather conditions. The race committee aboard the TYC committee boat, will display the postponement flag-red with white vertical stripes—to signal any delays in the start. Spectators should stand off, clear of the starting line and racecourse buoys so as to avoid any interference with the racing fleet.

On the water, just before Saturday's Trans Tahoe Race, racers and spectators will render a salute to our recently deceased staff commodore, Les Bartlett, who loved the Trans Tahoe Race and won it five times. For the salute, the committee boat will blast its horn and lower its US ensign for several minutes while race participants and spectators scatter flower petals on the water in honor of Bartlett. Petals will be available at the Skipper's meeting at 1000 Saturday July 9 in the TYC clubhouse.

Les Bartlett was an accomplished sailor who knew the location of every whisper of wind on

Lake Tahoe. These winds come in from the southwest, through the Blackwood and Ward canyons, and onto the Lake, where they spread out in multiple directions in what is known as a fan puff. Bartlett could play these puffs to perfection and thereby cruise past excellent sailors. Last year, at age 81, Bartlett won first in his division in the Trans Tahoe.

As you can see, there will be many exciting events. If you are looking to crew on a boat or are a boat owner looking for crew, feel free to contact the club and we will spread the word for you. DOCKWALKER TRAINING – The California State Parks Division of Boating and Waterways (DBW's) and the California Coastal Commission's Boating Clean & Green Program, the Bay Foundation (DBW's Clean Vessel Act program) in partnership with the US Power Squadrons, the US Coast Guard Auxiliary and the Lake Berryessa Partnership will conduct more Dockwalker training this year.

Dockwalkers are trained to engage members of the public and the boating community to adopt clean boating practices. Dockwalkers share clean boating information with boaters and distribute educational materials (boater kits), while visiting marinas, launch ramps, marine supply stores, boat shows and special events (i.e. regattas, opening days, among others). During our Concours D'Elgance in August, part of our volunteer staff is for "dockwalkers". Are you interested in getting involved?

RECREATIONAL BOATERS OF CALIFORNIA (RBOC) – PICYI created Recreational Boaters of California (RBOC) in 1968 as a governmental advocacy organization representing California boaters. It is committed to promoting the enjoyment, protection, and responsible use of our waterways. RBOC continues to work a number of issues with real importance to the recreational boating community. Here is a summary of some of the current issues.

VESSEL OPERATOR CERTIFICATION - RBOC is working with the Division of Boating and Waterways as it prepares a new boat operator educational program that requires operators of boats powered by engines be certified by passing a state-approved course. A representative of RBOC is on the Technical Advisory Committee, working to advise the Division as it implements the new program. The requirement will begin to phase in over a seven-year period starting in 2018.

BOATING UNDER THE INFLUENCE - AB 1829 [LEVINE] - RBOC is supporting AB 1829 [Levine] that would clarify the boating under the influence law.

ABANDONED WATERCRAFT ABATEMENT FUND - RBOC is opposing AB 2092 [Frazier] as introduced unless the bill is amended so that recreational boaters' funds will not be used to rid the waterways of abandoned commercial vessels.

SB 1162 COPPER BOTTOM PAINT RESTRICTIONS – RBOC is working together with BoatUS, urging approval of the Biotic Ligand Model [BLM] for the marine environment, providing regional water quality control boards with area-specific information regarding need for controls on copper-based anti-fouling paints.

RENEWABLE FUEL STANDARD – Proposed limit changes still under discussion

Sailing The Seychelles

Don't Forget Your TYC Reciprocity

In May 2015, we had the opportunity to use our yacht club reciprocal benefits in a most exotic place – the Seychelle Islands (officially, the Republic of Seychelles), in the Indian Ocean, 1,200 miles northeast of Madagascar. We "crewed" for our long-time friends & St. Francis Yacht Club members Jim & Jo Patrick, who have been worldwide cruising sailors for years. We picked up our 46-foot Leopard catamaran in Victoria, Mahe, capital of the Seychelles.





Before getting underway, we toured the Victoria area by car. Driving a rented right-hand drive manual shift car on the "wrong" side of the road, British-style, was very scary. Later, we had a pleasant evening of cocktails and dinner at the very relaxed Seychelles Yacht Club, including a visit with the club Commodore and burgee exchanges. Can you find the Seychelles YC burgee now hanging in our clubhouse?



The Seychelles is a 115-island archipelago, stretching from Mahe in the "Inner Islands" (the mostly granite island group we sailed), to the most outer of the "Outer Islands" (mostly sand/coral atolls), up to 600 miles to the southwest. The inner islands are lovely, with a startling range of brilliant blue seas, secluded anchorages and beaches snuggled against the rugged granite landscape, covered with tropical greenery. The archipelago has world-class diving, bird watching and sport fishing. While not nearly as developed as the more traveled islands in the Caribbean, there are lovely existing resorts and more development planned (mostly Gulf State oil money).

The weather was very hot and humid, so although we were quite comfortable during the day while sailing place-to-place, we were most thankful for the very efficient air conditioning while at anchor. An avid fly fisherman, I had to bring suitable equipment, but found it most practical to troll big flies well behind the boat as we traveled from island to island daily – the really prime fly fishing for bonefish and permit are in the outer islands, well out of reach for our trip. We had sautéed fresh tuna steaks as the entree two evenings - quite nice!







The route to and from the Seychelles is through Dubai, so on our return, we dallied for three days to see the remarkable modern city that has developed over the past 20 years. We toured the Burj Khalifa (2,717

feet, 209 floors), last summer still the tallest building in the world. The architecture is amazing - buildings look like modern art pieces. There currently are 18 completed building at least 300 meters (984 feet) in height, the most of any city in the world. Of particular interest to TYC Penguins, Dubai also has an indoor ski resort, Ski Dubai, part of the Mall of the Emirates. The "resort" has a 280 foot-high indoor mountain with real snow, hosting 5 runs of varying difficulty, including a 1,300-foot run, the world's first indoor black diamond run. Hey, how about a Penguin outing to Ski Dubai

next season?

It was all a great adventure. But remember, if you do intend to use your reciprocity while traveling, a letter from the TYC to the club to be visited is appropriate. Add to the enjoyment of your next trip. 1



Wine Events


e got off to a great start this year on January 30, when over 30 members gathered for a scrumptious wine-pairing dinner prepared by our downstairs neighbors at Dockside 700. Our Club Manager, Ryan Hulstyn, took the point in coordinating the event and committee member Nan Brown provided wine notes. We featured four of the upscale new "by the bottle" wines available at your club bar. The menu included: Crispy polenta croquette and mixed greens salad paired with '13 Duckhorn Sauvignon Blanc; coconut-battered fried prawns served with orange chili sauce, paired with '13 Rombauer Chardonnay; award-winning "Lamb Lollipops" marinated with garlic, lemon and herbs topped with crumbled feta and a balsamic reduction and paired with '09 Gia Domella Zinfandel; and flank steak served with a blackberry merlot demiglaze, paired with '11 Keenan Merlot.

Your Wine Events Committee, comprised of Nan Brown, Sol Gold, Terra Kanwetz, Walter Nelson, Andy R. Wagner and myself are at work on the calendar of events for the rest of the year.

The next event, which will have happened April 30, shortly before this B&T presstime, is brought to us by Sol and will feature the outstanding wines of VGS Chateau Potelle. Potelle produces artisan wines, rooted in French wine tradition. The winery is the 1983 creation

of Jean-Noel Fourmeaux who came to Napa from France in 1980. Our tasting will be paired with the matchless appetizers of Executive Chef Scott Yorkey (Jake's). Included wines and apps are: 2015 Riviera Rose; 2013 Sauvignon Blanc with lemongrass shrimp in avocado crema, coconut curry, sweet & spicy citrus sauce; 2013 VGS Chardonnay (Sonoma Mountain) with dungeness crab cakes, fennel slaw, lemon remoulade; 2013 VGS Zinfandel (Mt. Veeder) with slow roasted short rib wonton tacos, sweet ginger-chili glaze, macadamia nuts; and 2011 VGS Cabernet Sauvignon with beef tenderloin shiitake soy jus, truffle butter toast. This innovative tasting is our first of a new idea to try an upscale tasting with quality appetizers combining the social mingling of our usual tastings with the food quality of our wine-pairing dinners. Hope you enjoyed it.






