The format for this year was the same as last year, with 126 members attending in person and an additional 16 members taking advantage of access by Zoom.

Commodore Sol Gold reviewed the format and procedures for this meeting and began the Power Point presentation. The agenda was presented so members could follow more closely, although it had been sent out to membership prior to the meeting.

After the Call to Order, the motion was made to approve the minutes of the 2022 Annual Meeting. The minutes were approved and the reports for 2023 began.

Sol reviewed the 2022-2023 year, emphasizing club improvements, such as our new committee boat, our strong financial status, and our incredible membership numbers.

Sol sincerely thanked our staff for their support throughout the year and the volunteers for making his year as Commodore a memorable one.

Vice Commodore Lynn Mullen reviewed the many social events of the year as well as some new events focused on community support, such as the Achieve Tahoe - Tahoe Yacht Club Cruise Out and other charitable organizations events.

Lynn particularly wanted to highlight and thank ALL the activity leaders for their dedication and organization throughout the year. These members selflessly kept our members' schedules full and fun.

Rear Commodore Ray Landgraf thanked our staff who keep all our events running smoothly on and off the water. They make our clubhouse an active and engaging place. Ray expressed the club's gratitude to all the volunteers who chair committees and who contribute so much to the life of the club, such as the Hospitality, Race, Membership, Block & Tackle, and IT Committees.

Port Captain Judd Holiday introduced the new committee boat, a 2013 Boston Whaler 2700 Vantage. Power is from twin 225 HP Mercury outboard engines. Judd thanked John Sakrison, Mike Simmons, and Bruce Fetter for the invaluable help in finding the boat, arranging delivery of the boat, and getting the boat in the water.

Board member and Treasurer Vince Forte assured the membership that the Club's finances are in healthy condition, and that the Club should complete the Fiscal Year 2023 on budget.

Terry Krivan, representing Membership Chair Lauren Klemp, reported that the committee had created many improvements over the past year, including a new online membership application package (application, sponsor, and seconder forms), with more detailed information requirements to provide a better picture of new applicants. During the year, the club reached the 450-membership cap, with 21 new memberships welcomed to the Club in 2023, and with additional applicants now on the club's waiting list.

Sailing was adventurous as always, with the Spring and Summer Laser Series on Monday evenings, and Spring and Summer Wednesday Night Series for keelboat sailors. The list of those winners is listed in the minutes of this meeting and will be published in the Fall edition of the Block and Tackle magazine.

John Sakrison, Chairman of the OTB activity, noted that there was outstanding OTB participation for 2023.

The new slate was elected by acclamation by the members.

With the agenda of the Annual Meeting complete, a motion to adjourn was then passed and the End of the Year party began. It was a time for celebration and a time of good wishes to the new Board of Directors.

weekend warriors



Now, as we wind down the summer of 2023, I am happy to share that this new boat has been a great success. It has met the needs of the club and all demands placed upon it. Much of this success has been due to the significant efforts of Mike Simmons, who unselfishly

dedicated much of his spare time adding, modifying, and tweaking the boat so that it met and will continue to meet the specific needs of the club. By summer's end this boat truly is the perfect support tool for all of the club's needs now and into the future.

In the coming weeks we will be pulling the remainder of our fleet - kayaks, SUP's, and sailboats - ensuring safe storage through the winter months. The club has decided to sell our two Sunfish sailboats and will be sharing this news through our weekly newsletters. Our objective is to find a few club members who can own and enjoy these in the coming summer season.

The Cobia, our utility boat, continued to meet the needs of the club. Our current plan is to continue using it through at least summer of 2024. We are preparing it for safe storage so that it is ready when summer comes again.

As stated previously, California law will soon be requiring all boaters to carry a California Boater Card. This recent new law will be phased in per the following schedule:

- January 1, 2023 Persons 50 or younger must now have a valid California Boater Card
- ▶ January 1, 2024 Persons 60 or younger must have a valid California Boater Card



 January 1, 2025 - All boat operators must have a valid California Boater Card

There are a number of on-line options for obtaining your operator's license. These courses typically cost approximately \$50.00 and take 3-5 hours to complete. See californiaboatercard.com/course for more information.

For Nevada residents, all persons operating a boat with more than 15 horsepower and who were born after January 1, 1983 must take and pass a boater education course or proficiency test which has been approved by Nevada Department of Wildlife. \$\ddots\$


# Treasurer Report

he Tahoe Yacht Club is in a sound financial condition as of the end of July 2023. The Club has experienced significant growth in membership in 2022 and 2023 YTD. The impact of this growth is reflected in the increase in Assets on the Balance Sheet and growth of Operating Income reflected in the Income Statement.

#### **Balance Sheet**

Total Assets increased by \$169,000 in the last 12 months, an approximately 16% increase. This allowed the Board to increase reserves for the Centennial Anniversary Fund by \$20,000 and increase the Deck Remodel Fund by \$50,000. The Club was also able to

purchase a new Committee Boat. Total Equity increased by \$165,000.



#### **Income Statement**

While Operating Revenues have increased by \$98,000 YTD, our operating margin has held steady at a budgeted breakeven. The increased revenue has supported increased social events, extended operating hours and increased staff expenses. Expenses for insurance, utilities, rent and legal all have increased compared to the prior year. 3







# The Tahoe ILCA Championship Regatta

at Stampede Reservoir BILL & TERRY KRIVAN

f you have never participated in a sailing regatta with 30-40 boats in three classes participating, you have really missed something! Terry & I just had our first experience as volunteers on the signal boat for the first day of the weekend at the Tahoe ILCA Fleet Championship Regatta at Stampede Reservoir in early September.

Moving all the TYC boats to Stampede is a major task, including the TYC Lasers/Picos, and the more formidable motor craft that manage the regatta: the new Whaler committee boat (regatta signal boat), our Cobia (markset boat), and John Siegel's big Protector (the safety boat). Of course, most of the competitors from around northern CA transport their own boats, so the small launch ramp is busy with off-loading boat trailers. And finally, to paint the scene, the nearby campground is full of many campers who stayed overnight at the lake.

We were astonished at the expertise involved in setting the course – selecting a location on the lake, considering the depth of water for securely anchoring the various buoys, wind direction, and course design. A total of six buoys must be properly located by the markset boat with respect to the wind, water depth, and overall design of the course.

All the while, 30+ boats in three Laser classes are milling about smartly. The most advanced sailors sail an ILCA-7 (Full Rig) boat, which is the Men's Olympic Class Dinghy. The advanced but lighter sailors sail an ILCA-6 (Radial) boat, which is the Women's Olympic Class Dinghy. The smaller, younger sailors sail the Laser Pico boats, with a distinctive white and blue sail.

Then the action starts. The flags go up, signifying what boat class and course to use. Sound signals indicate the three-minute countdown to

"Start". During all of this, 15-20 boats are edging toward the starting line, angling for the best position without crossing the line early. All this requires intense focus by the signal boat crew - everything crisply on time, in the proper sequence, with everyone focused on their jobs.

With the first race underway, the sequence starts again for the next class of boats. The intensity builds with a Class about to start, as

> the previous Class is nearing the finish line - make sure the finishing boats pass through the gate before heading for the finish line, keeping track of the sail numbers of the boats as they cross the line and how many are still on the course (number that started minus the number that have now finished).

And oh, we see a boat or two capsized in the brisk wind is the sailor doing OK in efforts to right the boat? On several occasions, a boat has "turned turtle" (totally upside down), much more difficult to right. Signal boat notifies the safety boat, to ensure they have eyes on the boats trying to recover. At one point, a boat was beached at a far shore with equipment problems and at the end of the day, another boat was dismasted and required a tow back to the launch ramp.

It was a very full day, for both the competitors and for the race management team. And then the next day, they all did it over again! What an accomplishment and commitment! Hat's off to John Siegel, Andrew Casci, Mike Simmons, John Sakrison, Christina Shaw, Jill Raduziner, Dan Hauserman, Bryce Griffith, Ben Tallarigo and the many others who helped. Andrew's column, "Around the Club" has a good (and complete) listing of all those who make our sailing program go.

Even if you, like us, are not sailors, you are missing an adventure if you do not attend, as a spectator or better yet, as a volunteer next year. 🕹



# Henry J. Kaiser and His Winning Ways

#### **TAHOE YACHT CLUB COMMODORE 1938**

Arguably one of the most famous of the Tahoe Yacht Club's Commodores, Henry J. Kaiser, was a member whose presence in the early days of the Tahoe Power Boat Club was keenly felt both for his competitive nature and his entrepreneurial spirit.

From the time of his arrival on the Tahoe scene, Kaiser became preoccupied with boat racing, often against his most famous rival and fellow industrialist, R. Stanley Dollar, Sr. (Commodore 1935), and his son, R. Stanley Dollar, Jr. (Commodore 1949 – 50). These early activities led to Kaiser joining what was then called the Tahoe Power Boat Club where he was determined to make "a big splash"! In July 1938, he was elected Commodore coinciding with the club's name change to the Tahoe Yacht Club.

During the next 20 years Kaiser would race boats including BESS, a 33' Baby-Gar (named for his wife), against Dollar's 1924 Nevins runabout, BABY SKIPLONG, a two-time winner of New York's famous "Gold Cup" Races. Kaiser, liking to hedge his bets, often entered two boats in the same race. During the 1937 race season that strategy backfired when, unfortunately, his BESS, the 1935 Lake Championship winner, met an early demise, burning at the Tahoe Tavern dock just one hour after the first race!

In later years HORNET II, a 29.6' step-hull GarWood, LEMME GO FIRST, a late 1920's raised deck GarWood and the "jet age" aluminum HOT METAL and SCOOTER were among his flotilla of Lake Championship and Lake Tahoe - Mapes Gold Cup entries. According to Kaiser's official biographer, Albert Heiner, Kaiser boats "in his first half-dozen years of racing, won more than 30 trophies". HORNET II (under the name of FLEUR DU LAC) took eight Lake Championship trophies from 1936 -1951.

Kaiser, who also had a love for the beauty of Lake Tahoe, probably born of his early days at Lake Placid, was busy with other projects during these racing years.

In 1935 he purchased 16 acres of lakefront property on Tahoe's West shore at what is now known as Tahoe Pines. He proceeded to build his famous

Fleur du Lac estate in an incredible 30 days!! Kaiser used his usual way of completing any construction project -build as fast as it could be done and faster than anybody else would even dare to try! His crews, working literally day and night, filled the swamp (probably today known as protected wetlands) created by Blackwood Creek's entry into the lake. Neighbors noted a plume of silt in the lake caused by the building but by the time their formal complaint was filed, construction was finished.

The family enjoyed Fleur du Lac for many years, entertaining many prominent people of those days such as Governor Pat Brown & "Captain of Industry" Howard Hughes with whom Kaiser worked on the Spruce Goose and other projects. Kaiser's son, an Orinda resident, continued to use the estate until it was sold in 1962 for \$387,500\*. By then, though, Kaiser's interests had moved on to land development in Hawaii.

Henry J. Kaiser was born in Sprout Brook, New York in 1882. His formal schooling ended at age 13 though he spent the rest of his life "learning". By 1900, he was a photographic equipment salesman and traveling to Lake Placid that summer, met Bess. Obviously smitten, he asked for her hand but Bess's father forbad the marriage until Kaiser had made a certain amount of money and built her a house. Like so many before him, Kaiser moved West and in 1907, meeting both requirements, he and Bess were married. By 1913 they were settled down in Oakland from where Kaiser embarked on an extraordinary career. Beginning in construction, he quickly built an industrial empire that included public works projects, roads and material (concrete, asphalt, aluminum), a steel plant on the West Coast as well as many of the WWII "Liberty" ships and established the Kaiser Permanente Health Care system.

After a very busy 85 years, Kaiser passed away in Hawaii in 1967. One of his final projects was developing a residential district and a world class hotel on Oahu.

\*For a good look at the Kaiser estate, rent the movie "Godfather II". All of the Tahoe scenes were filmed there shortly before most of the buildings were razed to build the Fleur du Lac development we see today. 🕹



### Achieve Tahoe Tahoe Yacht Club Cruise Out

n June 27, 2023, the Club hosted Achieve Tahoe participants and staff on a Lake Tahoe boat cruise. Achieve Tahoe is an organization based out of Palisades – Alpine Ski Area that is dedicated to providing outdoor activities, both winter and summer, to people with a disability.

The Achieve Tahoe -Tahoe Yacht Club Cruise-Out was a one-day event, starting at the Tahoe City Marina in front of the TYC clubhouse. The Cruise-Out proceeded along the West Shore as far south as Emerald Bay before returning to Tahoe City for a TYC-hosted lunch. The cruise-out flotilla consists of six boats, each carrying Achieve Tahoe participants plus their caregivers, and a trained Achieve volunteer. There were 11 Achieve Tahoe participants plus caregivers for a total of 22. A TYC committee boat was included in the flotilla for coordination and safety. In all, there were 6 TYC owner boats plus the committee boat, a total of 7. A club member had prepared a detailed Cruise-Out Guide of points of interest and historical events along the West Shore which could be read as a narrative of what the guests were seeing. However, some guests just wanted to speed along, while others preferred a more relaxed pace. Each boat skipper tried to give their guests a cruise tailored to their interests. After cruising, all were treated to lunch and camaraderie back in the clubhouse.

A post Cruise-Out review was conducted with the participating TYC members and Achieve Tahoe staff. It was quickly declared a success

and should be continued. Of course we learned a few things, like not having all the boats on the fuel dock at the same time. Feedback from the Achieve Tahoe staff indicated they could have had three times more participants and caregivers. It was a very popular activity. However, the event was intentionally kept small to give the club experience holding this kind of event with Achieve Tahoe and with the hope of expanding the event in future years.

Achieve Tahoe works with people with a wide range of disabilities, to give them experiences they might never have imagined they could achieve successfully. In accomplishing a specific achievement, whether skiing down a slope unassisted or paddling a kayak, the sense of accomplishment is very rewarding. A motto posted on the wall at the Achieve Tahoe Center at the Palisades Alpine Ski Area is "If I can do this, I can do anything". One never knows how one seed of accomplishment will sometimes grow! Several TYC members have worked with Achieve Tahoe for years, assisting with both the winter and summer programs. Based on that experience, the idea for the Cruise-Out was born and modeled after the Wheelchair Regatta in the Bay.

The Club is now planning to hold the Cruise-Out over two days in June 2024. This will provide the opportunity for more Achieve Tahoe participants to experience the ride on Lake Tahoe as well as provide for more TYC boat owners to be involved.

Unfortunately, we did not have a win this summer, but that does not reflect the successes within our matches, the competitive air of our players, and the comradery.



# Environmental Activities by tiffany maclaughlin



It was Lake Tahoe's deep, blue waters that coalesced our membership nearly 100 years ago. It's why we are here, and as such, embrace the responsibility to protect our Jewel of the Sierra.

COVID-19 pandemic-related effects on the Tahoe basin were measurable from the ceaseless accumulation of crowds causing a myriad of environmental impacts. In response, our Blue Crew was launched with the mission, "To use the collective resources of our membership to engage in activities to help preserve Lake Tahoe for future generations." Here is a summary of our membership's stewardship:

KEEP TAHOE BLUE (KTB) FOUNDATION, BLUE CREW

July 2021 launched our first community cleanup and since then, over 100 members collected more than 1,200 pounds of trash and recycling from our designated area – the shoreline, grounds, and parking areas near the clubhouse. During our cleanup days, we categorize the type of trash found and submit this data to the Foundation. KTB uses lake-wide community data to solicit federal funding for ongoing conservation efforts.

#### TRUCKEE RIVER WATERSHED COUNCIL

#### **River Monitoring Station**

Lake Tahoe has one outlet in Tahoe City creating the headwaters of the Truckee River that flows over 140 miles to its termination at Pyramid Lake in Nevada. Our Club has adopted the Council's Monitoring Station #1, where we donate time throughout the year in a unique opportunity to collect data from the river's origin. Our data is compiled with more than 30 years of statistics of data along the watershed, allowing the Council to respond to human

impacts from the past 200+ years.

#### **Watershed Council Truckee River Days**

In October 2023, our club's Blue Crew will participate in Truckee River Days where we restore habitat along the watershed in response to data collected at monitoring stations. This program provides a full circle of environmental conservation by our membership: elimination of trash going in the lake by our trash cleanup crew; data collection from Monitoring Station #1 testing for water clarity and watershed health at the headwaters; and boots on the ground restoration work along the watershed in response to collected data.

Yachtsmen at heart, we love being on the water; but our Club is aware of the impacts we have and are eager to share our resources with the Lake Tahoe community. As we celebrate our centennial anniversary, the Tahoe Yacht Club is proud of its commitment to support the preservation of the Lake Tahoe Basin for future generations.



Foundation held the Lake Tahoe Concours d'Elegance on August 11th & 12th at Obexer's Boat Co. The exhibition was sold out with



Perlita Too | 1953 Riva 26-ft Tritone | 350 HP Scripps V-12 Jason & Anna Anderlite - Santa Cruz, CA



From the longest selling boat brand in the history of the world comes the profoundly important and uncompromising Perlita Too. Named to be the smaller companion vessel to the Perlita yacht owned by movie producer Roland Reed who was documented to be the first owner. It is known that he took delivery from none other than Carlo Riva, who felt the exposure of a Hollywood magnate would boost the Riva image. Sold new for \$1,360 U.S., Mr. Reed enjoyed being the center of waterfront attention. Perlita Too, discovered in a

California barn circa 1989, was subsequently moved to her new home here on Lake Tahoe. There were a few who owned her along the years; Alan C. Furth, a Lake Tahoe boat collector and Southern Pacific Railroad lawyer and then famed race car builder and driver, Briggs Cunningham III. It was to be the very first Riva ever to wear the "Tritone" nameplate (named for "God or Guardian of the Sea") and equally important, the very first Riva to land on US shores. In her first appearance at any show in over 40+ years, this is THE single boat responsible for transforming the Riva brand into a status symbol worldwide. From the moment she made her debut at the California docks in 1954, to this day at the world famous 2023 Lake Tahoe Concours d'Elegance, she does not fail to disappoint. Having gone through a painstaking multi-year restoration that, even Carlo Riva himself claimed,

his family-owned RAM Restoration Company could not have matched. Noted "1st in class" experts from each discipline were engaged to present her in this fantastic form. Please enjoy this first-ever, since being completed, showing of... "The First Riva Tritone." Perlita Too. \$\ddot\$

Tucker is a 1956 20' Chris-Craft Custom Sportsman Utility. It had its original 158 HP MBL engine. The boat was originally shipped with several custom-ordered features, including the split from the seat, paneled interior, and a midship seat (missing). We added two upholstered cubes for flexible seating and storage. In 2009, Tucker topsides, transom, and deck were completely restored and refastened by Chris Ford. In 2011, its original engine was rebuilt by Aims Machine in Reno. In 2018, its bottom was replaced by Frank Casey. The boat was named after a beloved cat. In fact, Tucker's ashes are in the transom paint, spelling out his name. Tucker was brought to Tahoe from Oklahoma in 2004. The boat's mid-length and open utility design makes it a fun, handy boat that is perfect for Lake Tahoe. Tucker was featured in the January/February 2012 issue of Classic Boating Magazine.  $\$

TYC is a long-time member of the Pacific Inter-Club Yacht Association (PICYA), formed in San Francisco in 1896 to improve communication between yacht clubs, provide uniform racing rules, and to generally encourage yachting and promote safe good times on the water. From the five chartering clubs, today more than 100 member clubs in Northern California have a combined membership of approximately 15,600 boating families.

#### **Fall Events**

With over 100 member yacht clubs in Northern California, there are a lot of events and reasons to visit other clubs: Everything from cruise-ins, regattas, Delta island parties, luau's, beer can racing, Opening Day on the Bay, to welcoming social events. A calendar of events can be found on each club's website, and clubs love to welcome reciprocal visitors (a benefit of your TYC membership). A display of burgees and links to PICYA member clubs is included on the PICYA website.

#### **Delegate Meetings**

Each member club of PICYA is allowed up to three delegates who represent that club at monthly delegate meetings hosted by yacht clubs around Northern California. These meetings offer an opportunity to exchange ideas and information between PICYA member clubs. Tahoe YC will host one of the delegare meetings on October 14, as we do about every two years. Visiting delegates are alway very complimentary in comments about TYC.



#### Margot Brown Wheelchair Regatta

Of special note is the upcoming Margot Brown Wheelchair Regatta held annually (except during Covid years) by Encinal Yacht Club. This year's event is on September 30, 2023. In the past, over 300 have participated to provide veterans, many confined to wheelchairs, with the rare opportunity to experience a power boat cruise on the Oakland Estuary and San Francisco Bay along the San Francisco water front. Baskets of personal hygiene items (like toothpaste, shampoo, etc.) are being curated for participants, and donations of such items are requested by Staff Commodore Elizabeth Allison, chocho2479@aol.com. Alternatively, consider volunteering or donating through the PICYA Foundation (501c) website. Yearly, TYC does provide \$250 worth of logo items for distribution at the event.

#### Support to PICYA & RBOC

As we do each year, TYC donates funds to support both PICYA and RBOC efforts. Club members contribute add-on amounts designated for RBOC when renewing their membership, in 2023, amounting to \$1,376. Make sure you click that option in your TYC membership renewal. In addition to our donation to the Wheelchair Regatta mentioned above, in 2023 TYC also donated \$250 to the PICYA Scholarship Fund. "Thank you" to your Board of Directors and to you, our members, for continued support of PICYA's program.



ROC is the boating community's voice in Sacramento and beyond working to protect boaters' interests before state and local legislative and regulatory branches for

over 50 years. PICYA created Recreational Boaters of California (RBOC) in 1968 as a governmental advocacy organization representing California

boaters, committed to promoting the enjoyment, protection, and responsible use of our waterways.

RBOC works on many issues with real importance to the recreational boating community. For current interest items, SCAN THIS QR CODE.



One of the "hot issues" is the state's proposal to increase boater registration fees over 300% yet direct the revenue towards non-boating programs and services. The concern, as stressed by RBOC President Debrenia Madison Smith: "This levy will create a financial barrier to healthy on-the-water opportunities for the average California boater." RBOC has been very involved in working with state legislators and encouraging all boaters to contact state representatives, and following this multi-year involvement, the State's brief is expected later this month.

Californians have equitable access to on-thewater opportunities, and they encourage your
involvement and support. \$\ddots\$



#### CALIFORNIA BOATER CARD CARD

Off-season is a great time to take the required course and apply for your boater's card.

#### Q: What is a California Boater Card?

A: The California Boater Card will show that its holder has successfully taken and passed a NASBLA/stateapproved boater safety education examination. Beginning Jan. 1, 2018, California is phasing in by age the requirement that residents who operate a motorized recreational vessel on state waterways will be required to carry the California Boater Card. The card will be issued by the California State Parks Division of Boating and Waterways (DBW).

#### Q: Where did the idea of a California **Boater Card come from?**

A: Legislative bills requiring some form of boating education in the state have been authored over the years. On Sept. 18, 2014, Governor Edmund G. Brown, Jr. signed into law Senate Bill 941, which prohibits the operation of motorized vessels in California without a valid Boater Card developed and issued by DBW.

#### Q: What are the benefits of taking a boater safety course?

A: Not only is mandatory education the law, the California Boater Card Program promotes boating safety on our waterways. U. S. Coast Guard accident data show that states with some form of boating safety education have fewer accidents and fatalities than states without any boater education requirements.

#### Q: When will operators be required to have a Boater Card?

A: Code Section 678.11(b) contains the following phase-in schedule based on operator age:

- Jan. 1, 2023 Persons 50 years of age or younger
- Jan. 1, 2024 Persons 60 years of age or younger
- Jan. 1, 2025 All persons regardless of age
