



charitable donations and focuses on educational opportunities in the Lake Tahoe area that enhance expertise and understanding of maritime skills. The Foundation's primary fund-raising event is the annual Lake Tahoe Concours d' Elegance.

The Board consists of six Flag Officers -Commodore, Vice Commodore, Rear Commodore, Port Captain, Junior and Senior Staff Commodores (past commodores) and five Directors-at -Large.

Our Bylaws are the "Constitution" that we follow in governing the club. Further expanding on the Bylaws is our Rules and Regulations.

We invite you to spend some time with both documents to get an understanding of what guides our club and Board of Directors. In Section 1, the TYC Rules and Regulations provide further definition and clarification to our Bylaws. Section 2 of the Rules and Regulations provide guidance and policy regarding issues not specifically covered in the Bylaws. The Rules and Regulations are updated annually to revise Addendum A (current club fee structure and organization chart) and incorporate any other revisions to Board or club procedures. The most current version of both the Bylaws and Rules and Regs are posted on the TYC website.

You will soon receive a notification that the 2024 Nominating Committee has been formed and will be looking for members with interest in joining the Board at the 2024 Annual Meeting. More on the Nominating Committee's functions can be found in Article 15 of both the Bylaws and Rules and Regulations.

Another great way to get more involved in the club is to join one of the various activity groups. With sailing, power boating, bocce ball, golfing, hiking, biking, skiing/snowshoeing, paddling, pickleball, and our Blue Crew environmental action group, there are many activities for members to participate in. Or if helping make club events happen appeals to you, join the Hospitality Committee or help organize a wine dinner. Check out the TYC organization chart on page 27 of the Rules and Regulations section of our website or the "On Shore" and "On the Water" sections of the Block & Tackle. You'll see that there are lots of moving parts to the club and we are always looking for volunteers to help run our club.

# Update from the Port Captain

like an appropriate time to be reviewing club assets for the lake but with so many new members having joined over the past few years it always seems OK to share the what, where, and how to access our fleet.

You will be most successful in using the club boats by contacting Club management/ staff to ensure that boats/SUP's are available the day you want to

use one. To use any of the units, you will need to complete our checkout form which can be picked up from any club employee. This non-power fleet will be available for use after May 15th.

The club owns four kayaks, available to check out on a first come first served basis. These boats are stored in racks on the side of the adjacent building to the club (southern building). Staff will work with you to unlock the boats and arrange to get you paddles. Launching a kayak should be done on the southern side of the marina near the public pier. Please remember that life vests are a requirement and can be picked up in the club.

We have two inflatable SUP's that can be checked out from the club building. Again, a checkout form must be completed. Paddle and life vests can be picked up in the same location.

Finally just a reminder that all boat operators under 60 years of age must have a California Boater License after 1/1/24. There are many on-line courses which can help you obtain yours. These courses also have good guidance regarding safety considerations - winter/spring is a good time to think about updating such items on your boat. \$\mathcal{L}\$





For TYC members who drive or boat around *Dollar Point*, or may have a home in the area and are familiar with 'the Dollar House' on Chinquapn's property. Here is Part One of the Dollar Family's story, especially R. Stanley Dollar Jr., a young man, and how that family became an iconic part of the history of Lake Tahoe.

## Dollars of Destiny BY CAROL VAN ETTEN

he maritime legacy left to Lake Tahoe by R. Stanley Dollar, Jr. is unsurpassed in the 140 years of its boating history. While scores of would-be champions competed in the Lake's annual regattas from the 1920s through the 1970s, no individual left a greater mark on the sport than Dollar. His enthusiasm, skill and sportsmanship were superlative, capturing the admiration and respect of spectators and fellow racers.

Born in 1915, Dollar, Jr. was heir not only to the family fortune, but to the adventurous spirit that had earned it. The Dollar Steamship Company was by the time of his birth among the largest corporations in the world, and that world was young Stanley's oyster. The daring, shrewdness and adherence to a personal code, which had contributed to the success of his family's business ventures in previous generations, were much in evidence in the young man's character, though they would manifest themselves in quite a different arena.

The family's financial dynasty was started two generations earlier by Dollar, Jr's grandfather, Robert Dollar. Born in Scotland in 1844, Robert Dollar had immigrated at the age of 14 to Quebec, Canada, where he found work as a chore boy in the region's wilderness lumber camps. In his quest for self-betterment, the boy began to use his spare time to teach himself arithmetic and, when his supervisor caught him studying, he was promoted and put in charge of a crew of men. As time went on, he was given increasing responsibility and with money he was able to save from his wages, he began to purchase parcels of land which had promising stands of timber, eventually entering the lumber business on his own.

In 1874, Dollar married Margaret Proudfoot and the couple settled in Bracebridge, Ontario. From this location, Dollar began to develop a timber harvesting business on both sides of the U.S. - Canada international boundary. Success built on success, with Dollar investing all of his profits in more land. By this process, using his business acumen, daring and hard work, Dollar was gradually amassing a fortune in the timber industry. As the timber from each succeeding region of forested land was consumed, Dollar followed the westward migration of

lumber activity, relocating his family to California in 1888, where they eventually settled in San Rafael.

As Dollar's lumber business expanded, he needed to transport his product to newly developing international markets. His early experience with an unreliable shipper led, in the late 1890's, to his purchase of the 120-foot steamer NEWSBOY; the first vessel in what would become an international steamship dynasty.

The fortuitous timing of an event of world magnitude became the catalyst for Dollar's next business success. He had, previously, retained the Fulton Ironworks in San Francisco to build the *Grace Dollar*, a steamship named for his daughter. She would be his fourth ship, and her launch in May 1898 perfectly coincided with the stampede to the Klondike. This human stampede was set in motion by the discovery of gold there the previous summer. Within a year the *Grace Dollar* had paid for herself, running full every trip on a constant schedule between San Francisco, Seattle, St. Michael and Kotzebue Sound to deliver the multitudes of miners and their supplies to the new Promised Land. Building further on this success, Dollar next ordered the construction of

the 800-ton steamship *Robert Dollar*, which he leased out for passenger service during the next big gold rush to Nome. From that point, the enterprise grew steadily, comprising a fleet of 32 first-class steam vessels by the early 1930's.

Robert Dollar was personally fascinated with ships and their operation. While traveling aboard one of his ships, his daily regimen included much time in the pilot house, where he impressed his captains with his avid attention to and understanding of the mechanical functions of the ship. In the last three decades of his life, Dollar accompanied by his wife, Margaret, would devote a great deal of his time to travel. Their destination was often the Orient, where he personally saw to the development of a large and profitable new market. By the mid-1920s, there were few new worlds for the senior Dollar to conquer. The success of the Dollar Steamship Company was monumental and, by the time of Roberts's death in 1932, his son, R. Stanley Dollar, Sr., had assumed an increasingly important role in its operation.

However, at the same moment, a new world was just beginning – one that would match gentlemen sportsmen and their motorized toys against each other for bragging rights in the BoardRooms of West Coast Capitalism. It was this new world in which Robert Dollar's grandson, R. Stanley Dollar, Jr., would gain his own fame and prove his own excellence.

The stage was set in 1927, when R. Stanley Dollar, Sr. purchased an estate on the north shore of Lake Tahoe from Lora Moore Knight, who would later gain fame as the builder of Emerald Bay's Vikingsholm Castle. Dollar, Sr.'s purchase in 1927 of Wychwood, Knight's original Tahoe estate, extended from the south end of Carnelian Bay around Observatory Point to the edge of the Island Park Subdivision, now known as Lake Forest.

R. Stanley Dollar, Sr. 's purchase of Wychwood included the Observatory Point property, now known as Dollar Point. It also included a large pier, home to several hand-propelled watercraft and at least three former Knight boats powered by internal-combustion engines. These were *Chipmunk*, *Wychcraft* and *Wychway*.

*Chipmunk* and *Wychcraft* were designed for excursions along the lake's shore where serenity (and not speed) was the goal, both far too stately and slow for a modern young man's tastes.

Wychway (also noted as Wychway 75) was the most promising of the three with an unremarkable 225 hp stock engine. Good enough for a third-place finish but not a champion.

A fourth power boat, *President*, soon arrived at Tahoe to augment the castoff fleet. She was a 28-foot GarWood sedan, a smart-looking compromise, protective of the ladies' hairdos but capable of over 30 miles per hour across Tahoe's mile-high marine-scape. To state the situation honestly, though, none of the boats bobbing at the Dollar pier were really suitable for a modern young man of 14 with speed on his mind!

And that modern young man marches into Tahoe History but don't hold your breath as this story is: To be Continued  $\mathring{\bot}$

## Achieve Tahoe Tahoe Yacht Club Cruise Out Month

ast year we had a very successful Cruise Out. At the post event review, there was lots of enthusiasm to continue the event in 2024. Based on feedback from boat captains and Achieve Tahoe staff, the Cruise Out committee elected to expand to a two-day event, allowing more Achieve Tahoe participants and boat owners to be involved without exceeding the loading space limitations at the marina.

SAVE THE DATES - TUESDAY JUNE 25th AND WEDNESDAY JUNE 26th

Achieve Tahoe works with people with a wide range of disabilities and that was evident in the participants who showed up for the experience. We even had some in wheelchairs who were successfully loaded on boats. Some boats went all the way to Emerald Bay, depending on the interest of the participants, the caregivers and the boat captain.

In 2023, there were 11 Achieve Tahoe participants with varied disabilities and 11 caregivers, for a total of 22 on six boats plus a committee boat. This year we plan to expand to 24 Achieve Tahoe participants, 12 each day over the two days, allowing double the number of boats to participate and experience the gratitude of the participants and caregivers for their Lake Tahoe adventure.

Last year, we limited the cruise out to a small number of participants and boats, to allow the club, marina and boat owners to learn what worked well and what might need adjusting in the future. In 2024, we will



build on what we learned, particularly regarding boat staging and most appropriate use of dock space.

Last year the weather was perfect and we are hoping it will be as well for the Cruise Out of 2024. Watch for further announcements as we begin detailed planning for our next Achieve Tahoe YC Cruise Out. 3

Our Tahoe Yacht Club is for yachtsman and boating enthusiasts, but did you know we also have a Crew? Yep, that's right; we do! Our Keep Tahoe Blue Crew is made of members just like you, who meet throughout the year to perform activities in support of our Club's mission: To preserve the Lake Tahoe Basin for future generations. Our projects include:

#### TRASH CLEAN UP CREW

We meet three times a year and pick up trash in our Tahoe City Marina community. Since July 21st, we have trash-canned more than 1200 pounds of trash. SAVE-THE DATES in 2024 (10am-2pm): Saturday, April 27th; Friday, July 5th – Red, White & Blue Cleanup; and Saturday, October 12th. Our trash collection work is supported by the Keep Tahoe Blue Foundation who use our trash collection data to work with local, state and federal municipalities to put funds in action to address environmental concerns affecting the Basin.

#### STREAM TEAM

Three times a year in the spring/summer, our Stream Team meets at our monitoring station south of the Tahoe City Dam to collect data which is added to more than 30 years of statistics that the Truckee River Watershed Council uses to monitor the health of the Watershed. 2024 dates to be determined.

#### TRUCKEE RIVER DAYS

The Truckee Watershed Council works with volunteers on projects to improve/protect sensitive areas on the watershed. This year our members helped stabilize the WaSheShu stream in Squaw Valley. SAVE THE DATE: 2024 Truckee River Day, Sunday, October 20, 2024.

## AN FRANCISCO BAY WINTER SAILING

Lake Tahoe is well represented in the "Midwinters" this year – winter races hosted by most San Francisco Bay yacht clubs. Sailors from the Lake Tahoe area typically compete in the races organized by the Berkeley YC and the Sausalito YC.

In the Berkeley Midwinters, two of our yellow Santa Cruz 27s competed: Lickety Split skippered by Rick Raduziner and Sunshine Express with the Tallarigo family aboard.

Express 27s, J105s, J24s, J70s, J88s, Melges 24s and Moore 24s participated in the Regatta Pro series hosted by Sausalito Yacht Club. Tahoe sailors could be found in the Express, Melges, and Moore divisions.

Matt Hamilton's Melges 24 Chop Chop, with Stacy and Ryan Conner aboard, leads the fleet after four races with Nick Pullen's Powdered Toast Man in 3rd place. The 15-boat strong Express 27s were represented by five South Lake Tahoe Windjammer Yacht Club boats: Under the Radar (Greg Felton, 2nd), Hot Sheet (David Wick, 5th), Dianne (Steve Katzman, 6th), Eagle (Ross Groelz, 7th) and Wild Thing (Ray and Craig Wilson, 11th). John Siegel's Moorigami, stands atop the eight-boat Moore 24 fleet.

Both midwinter series continue with races on January 13 and February 10.

On January 27, the annual "Three Bridge Fiasco" will be conducted by the Singlehanded Sailing Society. Last year, 309 boats participated in this zany single and doublehanded event. It is quite a spectacle! There are three marks of the course: the Blackhaller buoy (near the GG Bridge south tower), Yerba Buena Island (under the Bay Bridge), and Red Rock (under the Richmond-San Rafael Bridge). Boats start by division, in front of the Golden

Gate Yacht Club (in either direction). Boats must round all three marks/islands (in any order) before finishing back at the Golden Gate Yacht Club. It is a long, wild race and given the congestion, not for the faint of heart!

## RACE MANAGEMENT TRAINING SEMINAR

On another note, Tahoe Yacht Club will be hosting a US Sailing Basic Race Management seminar at the clubhouse all day on February 3. This seminar is designed to inform and train race committee personnel on how to run regattas consistently and effectively. \$\ddot\$

## Junior Sailing

nce again, in partnership with the Tahoe City Public Utility District Recreation (TCPUD) Department, the community will be offered a comprehensive sailing and aquatics program.

Some of our outstanding programs include our adult night paddle boarding classes on lighted paddle boards, led by Kurt Williams the Recreation Dept. Superintendent at TCPUD. Our Aquanauts program for kids 6-8 years strives to teach them the basics of water safety and having fun on boats and in the water. Our Tahoe Adventures for teens gives them a wide range of activities, including sailing, navigation, paddleboarding, and mountain hiking.

#### 2024 Summer Community Sailing Programs

Our regular classes for ages 9-18 years are comprehensive, including Novice, Intermediate and Advanced training. These courses cover the full range of sailing training, and are designed to enable our students to be safe, competent sailors.

Our Junior Race Team plans include adding some new boats for the 2024 season. We hope to replace two of our older Lasers with new ILCA Lasers. In addition, we hope to purchase eight new Picos to replace our current team boats that are for our 6-8 year olds. While they have served our Juniors well, wear and tear have taken their toll and replacement is required for both safety and performance.

On water performance by our team was excellent this past season, with good finishes in all both local and away regattas. Personal growth and developmental leadership continue to be team goals, in addition to racing skill development. We plan to enhance our racing development program by bringing in top Laser coaches from the West Coast for some of our Monday afternoon race clinics.

The sign-up process opens the first week in May 2024, with classes filling up quickly, so try to sign up the first day. The TCPUD has not yet established the exact date, so watch for future announcements.

Some scholarships will be available through the Tahoe Community Sailing Foundation, to cover class and team expenses based on need. In 2023, the TYC Foundation marked the 49th year that the Concours d'Elegance was held on Lake Tahoe. The show continued the long tradition of not only showcasing outstanding classic boats, but also raising funds to allow the Tahoe Yacht Club Foundation to provide grants to deserving non-profits around the Lake.

After reviewing several grant applications, the Foundation Board awarded grants to three organizations. The Tahoe Community Sailing Foundation received a grant to continue their summer programs to teach and develop boating safety and skills. The North Lake Tahoe Historical Society received a grant to help them restore the Gatekeepers Museum in Tahoe City. The Great Basin Institute received a grant to help them restore the old boathouse at the Pope Estate and it's historic 1921 cruiser, the Quic Chakidn. All three efforts were found to be in accordance with the Foundation's charter.

YC is a long-time member of the Pacific Inter-Club Yacht Association (PICYA), formed in San Francisco in 1896 to improve communication between yacht clubs, provide uniform racing rules, and to generally encourage yachting and promote safe, good times on the water. From the five chartering clubs, today more than 100 member clubs in Northern California have a combined membership of approximately 15,600 boating families.



#### **DELEGATE MEETINGS**

Each member club of PICYA is allowed up to three delegates who represent that club at monthly delegate meetings hosted by yacht clubs around Northern California. These meetings offer an opportunity to exchange ideas and information between PICYA member clubs. Tahoe YC hosted one of the delegate meetings on October 14, 2023, as we do about every two years. Visiting delegates were again very complimentary about TYC and the meeting.



ANNUAL PICYA AWARDS DINNER On November 5, 2023, TYC delegates attended the PICYA Annual Awards dinner, held at the

Oakland YC, highlighting the contributions and accomplishments of numerous individuals and clubs over the year. This year, TYC was awarded the Bay and Delta Yachtsman Public Service Award, recognizing our environmental and community service activities.

#### Our Blue Team Efforts (Tiffany MacLaughlin - Lead)

- Since July 2001, members collected more than 1,200 pounds of trash and recycling from our designated area - the shoreline, grounds, and parking areas near the clubhouse.
- TYC has adopted the Truckee River Watershed Council's Monitoring Station #1, just downstream from Fanny Bridge, donating time in May, June, July, and September to collect water quality data at the Truckee River's origin.
- In 2021/2022, members donated their time and watercraft to support teams of boats and divers that circumnavigated the lake searching for and removing underwater
- In October 2023, a TYC team participated in the annual Truckee River Days, helping restore habitat on Washeshu Creek just downstream from the Palisades Tahoe.

#### Our Achieve Tahoe - Tahoe YC Cruise Out (Joe Cunningham - Lead)

Six TYC boats provided a one-day lake cruise experience for Achieve participants plus their caregivers and a trained Achieve volunteer, from the TC Marina down the West Shore with a script providing information about the points of interest along the way.

#### Other Community Service Involvement

- ► TYC also supports community sailing and junior sailing programs including the Junior racing team.
- ► TYC supports and participates in other community activities, including the Tahoe City SnowFest, the Tahoe City Downtown Association, and provides occasional nocost meeting/event space to local non-profit organizations.

This is the fourth year in a row that TYC has been recognized for some portion of our program (three years for the Block and Tackle, one year for public service). Hats-Off to Tiffany MacLaughlin for Blue Team leadership, to Joe Cunningham for the Achieve Tahoe Cruise Out event and of course to the many others who participated and support these and the other community-focused TYC involvements. See articles elsewhere in this edition for details about both the Blue Team program and the 2024 plans for another Achieve Tahoe – Tahoe YC Cruise Out.

#### Club of the Year (COTY) Results

During this awards dinner, the PICYA Club of the Year (COTY) was also recognized, based on a wide range of aspects of each club's activities. This year, the top club was the Ebony Boat Club, followed by the San Jose Sailing Club, the South Bay Yacht Club, and the Oakland Yacht Club, all four "Five Star" clubs. The TYC was again a "Four Star" club, in 9th place out of the total of 106 clubs in PICYA (the top 8% of the clubs). Again, well done to all who make our club program work.

#### OPENING DAY ON THE BAY

Opening Day on the Bay is scheduled for April 28, 2024, with the theme "Rockin' the Bay." In the past, we have had boats participate in the Parade of Boats and have had members ride on the committee boat to get a first-hand view of the festivities – a very enjoyable experience. More detail will be published as available.

#### PICYA SPRING CONFERENCE

The PICYA Spring Conference is scheduled for March 23, 2024 during which topics of interest to Northern California yacht clubs are discussed. The agenda and location were not yet available at the time of this writing. Any club member is welcome to attend. TYC typically has one or more attendees from our PICYA delegates or Board members.

CALIFORNIA VESSEL OPERATOR CARD As a reminder, beginning January 1, 2024, Senate Bill 941 requires that California boaters, 60 years of age or younger, have a California Vessel Operator Card (CVOC). By January 1, 2025, all persons, regardless of age, must have a CVOC. For residents of Nevada, requirements are somewhat different, but taking the course would be beneficial to any boater.

The BoatUS Foundation provides an approved on-line Boating Safety Course that provides the certification required by California.  $\checkmark$
