
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Membership Update

Rear Commodore

t is a privelage serving as your Rear Commodore this year. I want to thank the staff, Board of Directors, volunteers and members for making the most of this past year in the face of the challenges that the COVID-19 Pandemic produced. Let's all hope for a wonderful year ahead.

We just came off Placer County's watch list, which enabled us to re-open the club with some restrictions. The Board approved extending our hours through October; Wednesday through Sunday, 12pm - 8pm. Maximum occupancy is set at 30 people—members may bring up to two (2) guests with them (children count as guests) and food from Moe's BBQ must be ordered while visiting the club.

TYC's new security cameras have been installed and we are currently working on a policy to review footage when deemed necessary. We are also working on an Emergency Action Plan (EAP) for the club; including direction for employees and members as well as protection for important historical documents. Recent devastating fires, community unrest and other potential emergencies have necessitated such a plan.

Our staff is a integral part of making TYC work, starting with our General Manager Andrew Casci, who redefines multi-tasking in keeping the club running smoothly. Erika Leone, who previously was our resident Club Manager, is now our Communications and Media Manager, operating remotely from her home in New Orleans while keeping our website, Facebook pages, member communications and on-line club calendar current and engaging. Cynthia Lewis is not only our creative lead bartender, presenting signature cocktails for our events, but serves

as our Bar and Inventory Manager. She is responsible for managing bar inventory and in conjunction with member Teresa Prescott, does inventory for our retail operations. Rounding out our in-club staff, we have our stalwart bartenders Geno Gastelum, James Lichtenstein and Alicia Gallagher. Further, as the club is able to move to a more active social event schedule, we will be restarting the search for an Events Manager, an effort that was delayed as the COVID-19 restrictions took hold.

As we enter the shoulder season and navigate these challenging waters, be sure to visit the club to see old members and meet new members alike.

Treasurer Report

irst, I would like to extend a heartfelt thank you to Pam Holman, our Accountant and Andrew Casci, our General Manager. They make my job easier and together we form a great team.

Obviously, it has been a tough year due to the COVID-19 Pandemic with its restrictions on our club. However, we are very fortunate to collect the lion's share of our revenue from annual club dues during the month of January. Rest assured, we are well positioned to weather this storm through years of good fiscal management and have close to \$600,000 in cash assets spread out over low-risk money market and CD accounts.

As we project out through the month of December, we anticipate our budgeted revenue will be down by approximately \$60,000. However, we also project our budgeted expenses will be down by nearly the same amount.

There are some high points to mention — \$175,000 was diverted from low-yield money market accounts and invested in four (4) higher-yielding CD's laddered from 2 months to 10 months. We have also exercised strong budget management in the face of club closures and restrictions, including numerous meetings with the principals.

To say this year has been challenging is an understatement and we want to show appreciation for your continued and unwavering support. Part of our recent budget projection meetings was to explore the possibility of giving our membership a "thank you" for enduring our club closures and restrictions due to the COVID-19 Pandemic. As a result, I am pleased to inform you that the Board has voted to give something back to the membership. For those memberships that have yet to meet their annual minimum spend, we will only require that the 50% threshold be met. For those memberships that have already met or exceeded the annual minimum spend this year, the minimum spend threshold will be reduced by 50% for 2021.

Again, we want to thank you again for your continued support and eagerly look forward to the upcoming year. Finally, please remember to notify the club anytime the credit card information we have for your account on file changes. 1


The TYC Paddlers

SQUAW VALLEY & ALPINE MEADOWS

- 1. The icon pass is available for purchase and will be given priority for reservations to ski.
- 2. If you do not use your icon pass this season you can defer it to next year (2021 to 22) anytime between September 10, 2020 till April 11, 2021.
- 3. There will be no "day of" ticket sales.
- 4. There will be advanced day ticket sales online but very limited numbers will be sold.
- 5. Alpine Meadows and SquawValley (or whatever the new name will be) is scheduled to open on 25 November at this time.
- 6. Skiers will have to make advance reservations for the day they want to ski. I could call in advance and make a reservation for the Penguins but I would need an RSVP before so I can tell them how many people will be in our group.
- 7. At this point the policy for the Funitel is for family members only in each car. The tram is planning to run and have limited numbers in each car.

Hospitality Committee News

The club plans an interesting and varied program of social events over the program year. These include such events as a Halloween Party, an Easter Brunch, a Christmas Party with a visit from Santa, a Crab Feed, and an Italian Dinner. BOAT HISTORY FROM THE EXHIBITORS: The boat was named Robbie II after the original owner's grandson. She was custom built in 1947-48 for the family of Saul Farb, a prominent Toronto entrepreneur who created the city's first automated car wash business. The contracted builder was F.S. Crate & Sons of Lake Simcoe, located in Keswick, Ontario. Fred Crate started his boat building business in 1930, building small fishing craft and ultimately custom runabouts and cruisers. After a fire in the 1950's (that destroyed all boatbuilding records) the Crate family shifted their focus towards marinas and sales operations. To the Crate family's knowledge, this runabout is one of only three F.S. Crate vessels known to exist today.

In the summer of 2011, my wife and I were driving from Boulder to Denver, Colorado while traveling the country on our honeymoon road trip. Out of the corner of my eye, I spotted what looked like a 'wooden boat' sitting in cornfield. After claiming to my wife "this will only take a second", we pulled a u-turn and drove up the dirt road towards the boat. I pulled up



the cover at the transom and poked my head inside, completely surprised to find a large, unfamiliar triple cockpit runabout. The boat looked operational but clearly in need of a full restoration. After some research and conversations with her owners, we secured her purchase and transport back to New England.

After an extensive restoration, she is now lovingly named Nezzie. She floats on a new bottom but retains most of her original woodwork above the waterline. Her original power was reportedly a 6 cylinder Kermath but was replaced in the early 1950s with a Chris-Craft WB 200HP engine. She is decorated in plenty of chromed brass hardware, most of which is original. A very unique and striking design feature that sets her apart from virtually every other classic wooden boat is the overhanging aft deck and side planking which extend beyond the flat transom. This truly rare and one-of-a-kind runabout now spends her summers cruising Lake Michigan. \$\mathcal{L}\$

- Commodore's Report Commodore Arno thanked the club staff for their support throughout the challenging year. He reviewed the activities conducted early in the year and then after COVID constraints were imposed, the many outdoor activities along with numerous of virtual events.
- Vice Commodore's Report The club had started the year with typical mix of social, outdoor and water-related events, only to replan in mid-year, moving to a mix of virtual and outdoor activities, with minimal use of the clubhouse. The Concours d'Elegance and associated Mahogany Magic events were both cancelled, much to everyone's dismay.
- Rear Commodore's Report Vice Commodore Krivan presented the report for John Sakrison, who was unable to attend the meeting. The year was productive including refinishing the club bar top, painting all of the overhead conduits and installing a new video security monitoring system. The security system will not go live until the Board approves a policy document. He thanked the TYC Staff Commodores for their contributions to the Staff Commodore Fund, which provides funding for selected club improvements, including this year the new Mr. Frosty drink mixing machine. This machine will come into much use once the club returns to social events in the clubhouse.
- Treasurer's Report Treasurer Sol Gold presented the club's balance sheet as of July 31, 2020 (the last full month financials available) compared to the same data as of July 31, 2019. The club finances are quite healthy, despite the impact of the pandemic, with a net growth in equity from \$605K in 2019 to \$672K in 2020.
- Membership Committee Chair Margot Woodward reported a very successful year, despite the impact of the pandemic on club operations, with 29 new members to date and four months left in the year.
- Sailing Programs Director at Large Erica Mattson Siegel summarized the very active sailing program, with the Monday Night Laser series, the Wednesday Night Keel Boat series, the Trans Tahoe Regatta and the Garwood's Regatta. The season-ending Laser Fleet Championship is scheduled for mid-September at Stampede Lake, as in past years. Erica ended her presentation by thanking the many people that make all this racing happen -Principal Race Officers (PRO's), US Sailing Judges, markset and signal boat personnel. She summarized the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place winners in the various racing series over the summer then ended with information about the Junior Race Team Youth Sailing program. These youth racers represent the future of sailing and deserve club support.

• Port Captain Report -Commodore Arno provided this report in the absence of John Sakrison. He summarized the TYC floating stock, highlighted the increasing need for boaters to secure the California Boater Card, then presented a sum-

mary of the OTB results for the year. Luciana placing 1st, with a net time off-mark over the entire series of only 6 seconds. He thanked Greg Barraclough and Mike Simmons for their efforts throughout the season.

- Pacific Inter-Club Yacht Association TYC Delegate Jerry Landers summarized the founding and purpose of both the PICYA and the PICYA advocacy arm, the Recreational Boats of California (RBOC). He also highlighted TYC being recognized as a Three Star club, in the top 6% of the 100+ clubs in the PICYA, along with noting that our Block & Tackle publication received the Wilder Award as the best yacht club newsletter in 2019. Congratulations to Shannon Madison and her team.
- Trophies and Recognition Commodore Arno announced the Red Buoy Award, this year to Mike Simmons for his guidance regarding club insurance needs, for his work on planning and execution of the OTB program, his work as PRO for our Laser race program and for working as one of our markset boaters.
- Thank You to the Staff Commodores Commodore Arno thanked the Staff Commodores who have contributed to the Staff Commodore Fund, each year from which the club funds selected improvement projects. He asked the Staff Commodores to maintain that support in the coming year, in light of the continuing COVID-19 challenges.
- Penguins The Penguins had an active early season, with six ski outings averaging 15-20 skiers, a snowshoe outing and a group of ten, led by Penguin Pat Lucas, spending a week skiing in Zurs Austria. Then COVID effectively ended the season. Due to this truncation, the decision was made to not recognize a Penguin of the Year for 2020.
- Unfinished Business There was no unfinished business for this
- New Business Sr. Staff Commodore Ray Landgraf, representing the full Nominating Committee (Rick Raduziner, Donna Block, Robert Farac, Heidi Bensley) presented the list of candidates for the 2020/2021 Board of Directors. The slate as presented was approved by acclamation.
- Closing Comments After again thanking the outgoing Board, the staff and the many volunteers who make the club work, Commodore Krivan expressed the expectation that near-term relaxation of Placer County guidelines may again allow in-club operation on a limited basis. Jamie Arno was asked to the front to receive personal thanks and a bottle of champaign from Terry Krivan. Then Ross was asked to the front for final thanks for his dedicated work during the past year and to receive a bottle of "fine Sicilian lemon soda" (Ross is not a champaign man), along with by a shadow box containing a TYC burgee, a Commodore's flag and a graphic featuring the International signal flag hoist "BZ" (Bravo Zulu), a widely-used hoist meaning "Well Done", in recognition of his accomplishments during a very

HISTORY

Tahoe City Marina (current site of the TYC)

e will start our story in the late 1800's when Tahoe was a relative unknown to the general public. Back then most commerce in areas where there were deep waterways, were conducted by boat and or barge.

Much of the forest surrounding the lake was logged for use in and around the mines in Nevada between 1858 and 1890. Tahoe City was founded in 1864 and soon became a resort community and recreational destination, primarily for miners from Virginia City. It was the beginning of Lake Tahoe development which continues apace today.

A vessel named the "Iron Duke" hauled hay and other commodities from Tahoe City to Glenbrook for maintaining the mines in Virginia City. It was stated that Tahoe City was a major source of Timothy Hay to the mules that worked the mines and mule trains.

The Meteor launched in 1878 and the SS Tahoe launched in 1896 were both passenger carrying vessels which called the Commons Harbor, (current site of the Tahoe City Marina), home port.


July 4th 1901, the Lake Tahoe Railroad and Transportation Company was dedicated which started the world renown tourism trade in the Tahoe City area. The TCM site was the end of the line for the LTR&T rail system and the railroad continued to be a major part of the cross lake commerce. Some famous vessels such as the Steamer Nevada and George Whittel's Thunderbird, were launched and hauled out on the ways located at the TCM site, today a portion of the ways can still be observed from the marina entrance channel.

Tahoe Boat Company had its beginnings about 1930 when Norman Mayfield purchased part of the property from Southern Pacific which had acquired the property from the Bliss family.

Mayfield saw the need to build a protective structure, so between 1932 and 1935 he built a 300' structure out into the lake and another 300' arm that was roughly perpendicular and slightly curved. As pile driving at the time was not a feasible activity, rock cribs were built, then launched and sunk in place with rock much of which had been brought over from the East shore. Similar crib construction can be observed at the current marina behind the sheet pile wall that was driven in 1997. During this time the Tahoe Boat Company became a Chris Craft dealer and also launched a few new Hacker Craft.

In 1942 Fred Main joined Mayfield as a working partner, Fred had been the chief mechanic for Jake Obexer on the west shore. Early Chris Crafts were delivered by rail to Tahoe Boat where they were commissioned by Fred.

During the next few years the property was combined with the Standard Oil property and the rest of the property to the creek. A house was built for Fred on the north side of the creek. A rock wall near the waters edge is all that remains of that structure and is now an observation stop on the current Lakeside trail.



In 1947 Tahoe Boat hired Dick Clark and Joe Frey to help out with boat maintenance and refinishing work which was substantial winter work at the time. Fred Main announced his retirement in the late 1960s therefore patrons of the marina/boatyard, Dick Walker and Albie Miller purchased the entire 6.8 acres and operated it until Miller's death in the early 1970's.

In 1973 Moana revealed plans to tear everything down and build a 70 unit condo development. This attempt was faced with strong public opposition and the project ended up with a split where Moana kept the northern half of the property and John Kearns acquired the southern portion. Unfortunately (for some) the machine shop was torn down along with the attached storage building (Building 2) to create what is now the Boatworks Mall.

From 1975 to 1977 both properties were developed with Moana creating the Boatworks mall that you see today with only 2 of it's original tenants one of which is Jakes on the Lake. Mr. Kearns who had also retained the harbor portion of the marina redeveloped the old railroad buildings into the Roundhouse Mall, though there was never a roundhouse located on the property. Much of the original structures were retained. Also during this time the harbor was converted from fixed slips(which many had structures for canvas covered slips) to a redesigned floating slip marina. This project was financed through the sale of the slips using a dockominium scenario.

From about 1974 to 1994 the marina was operated and owned by Mr. Kearns until 1995-96 when it was then taken over by the current property owner the Gibb Trust or Thunderbird properties. Some of the items addressed were contaminant cleanup from the old railroad and Standard oil days, rebuilding all the slips, fortifying the breakwater, reroofing the mall building, finding replacement tenants ie Charthouse, remodeling building 6 and upgrading equipment and infrastructure.

1996 to present the property is now owned by Tahoe Yacht Harbor LLC and in about 1998 the effort was undertaken to expand the marina, which was completed in 2012. The Tahoe Yacht Club is now a tenant of the Tahoe City Marina in what was the upstairs portion of the Charthouse. The building that the TYC occupies was the old railroad maintenance building for the LTR&T (See below). The engine in the photo has been completely restored and can be viewed at the Nevada State Railroad Museum in Carson City. **3**

CALIFORNIA VESSEL OPERATOR CARD

As a reminder, as of January 1, 2020, California boaters 35 years of age or younger must have a California Vessel Operator Card (CVOC). Requirements for others will be phased in as follows:

- January 1, 2021 Persons 40 years of age or younger
- January 1, 2022 Persons 45 years of age or younger
- January 1, 2023 Persons 50 years of age or younger
- January 1, 2024 Persons 60 years of age or younger
- January 1, 2025 All persons regardless of age

The BoatUS Foundation provides a free on-line Boating Safety Course approved by the California State Parks Division of Boating and Waterways that provides the certificate required by California to obtain a CVOC.

The Story of Loki: The Stoic Tugboat

Bob and Mo Horvath have a 32' Nordic Tug named Loki. One very unique feature about Loki is that she has wheels! Bob, equipped with his commercial driver's license and a wide load permit, hauls Loki everywhere. The whole rig weighs 32,846 pounds; boat, truck and trailer going down the road. Loki (built in 1996) was purchased by the Horvath's in Southern California during 2014. She did not have a trailer at that time. After touring the So Cal waters, Bob and a

buddy spent a leisurely 10 days sailing her up the coast.

The seas were as expected; Point Conception had 5+ foot wind waves, 12 seconds apart. They were 2 hrs from the Golden Gate Bridge when the wind waves went from 6' to 10' @ 14 seconds and were full abeam when they rounded the point near the Mavericks. Swells were 6' which meant that most of the time they were in a 16' trough. They experienced a constant 40 degree starboard list, so the decision was made to head back out to sea in an effort to move the waves from full beam, back to quartering on the bow. 2 hours later they were able to turn inbound on the shipping lane under the Golden Gate. The decision was made, right then and there, to have a custom 5th wheel trailer built to avoid sea conditions like they had just experienced. They soon settled into a peaceful slip in the San Joaquin Delta, (Willow Berm Marina). A transport was designed and built which enabled Loki to visit Lake Tahoe, Lake Oroville, Shasta and eventually the Northwest.

The most memorable trip of Bob's boating career was taking Loki to Alaska. He moved Loki to the Northwest during the fall of 2016. She was first docked at the base of the famous Chihuly Glass Museum in Tacoma Washington. He and Mo first explored the south sound and spent New Year's Eve viewing space needle pyrotechnics after taking in a 5-Star dinner at the Elliott Bay

Marina. He eventually repositioned Loki to Anacortes for 3 months, taking in 4 seminars on planning a trip to Alaska. On June 4, 2017, he began the

first of 7 legs of travel logging 3,000 miles in three months.

For each leg he had a fresh crew, one of which included his son Justin and his son Hudson..
They chartered a twin jet boat complete with captain. Here is Huddy next to the control station.
The three met up with Mo in Juneau and made some great memories including Justin's gift

to remember his Alaskan adventure with his dad and Papa Bob. Here he is, bright eyed and bushy tailed at 5am headed to the airport for the plane ride home:

Mo has spent 42 years of her marriage to Bob boating everywhere, like France, Mexico, Canada and western Florida. She has seen it all and now she prefers to jet in and join one of Bob's adventures in progress. She gets to pick her desired port and this time she choose Glacier

Bay. They had to make a rather specific reservation exactly 60 days, to the minute, of their intended arrival as the federal government only allows

26 vessels in the bay during any one given time. Mo pressed the input button one second after the allowable period thus becoming eligible, for only 14 vessels allowed to make advanced reservations. On the Fourth of July they entered the bay, came up on park ranger's radar and were guided to the park headquarters in Bartlett Bay for their two hour orientation. The

Since they had planned a day or two to allow for weather delays prior



were also the owners and managers of the nearby hotel, The Tahoe Tavern. Bliss was an architect from San Francisco who ensured that the bishop paid the building cost of \$2200. On September 5th of that year, Bishop Moreland noted in his diary, 'At Tahoe, I held my first service in the unique and impressive outdoor Chapel of the Transfiguration just completed. Celebrated Holy communion, also read evening service and preached. About twenty were at the Holy Sacrament, and sixty at the evening service. Confirmed one, a young man – a bellboy at the Tahoe Tavern. The Outdoor Chapel is currently registered in the National Registry of Historic Building. It was fondly referred to as "the Summer Cathedral" by the Episcopal bishop. With all the summer visitors, it was the only Protestant church at the lake with the congregation comprised not only of the rich and famous as well as by the common folk who gathered there each Sunday. It was once described as "situated in a forest of pines half a mile south of Tahoe Tavern. A trail and road through the woods leads to it and the narrow-gauge railway passes rustic style, with massive rubble walls, the stones being dug out of the mountain sides; long framework for the roof and covering of shakes. The congregation is seated under the canopy of heaven, the seats being placed in a grove of pines facing the broad opening of the channel.'

In 1948, local residents requested a year round church to worship. In 1958, the current church was purchased for \$14 from the Southern Pacific Railroad which had used the facility as a train crewman's dormitory.

No longer viable as an Episcopal Church, the current owners purchased the property in 2019 with the goal of providing Sunday nondenominational church services, Christian youth summer camps, providing a conference and meeting facility and also a new wedding venue in Tahoe City. Today's property contains the Outdoor Chapel, main church, dorm rooms, commercial kitchen, a home and more. Many of our TYC members actually attended church ski retreats and summer camps at the venue while growing up. They are investing monies to renovate the venue anticipating an updated outdoor chapel, volleyball and basketball courts, a dance floor, small cottages and more all nestled within the gorgeous forest floor. Thank you MMC, we truly enjoyed the Tahoe history and tradition. **\$\frac{1}{3}\$**
