on your bike; get your kayak or SUP out of storage; refurbish your trusty hiking boots;



Thanks to Pastor Mike Boals of the MM Church and Pastor Ed Hilton of Christ the King Lutheran Church for their support for this event, which is the traditional TYC Opening Day of the boating season.

The Sail Committee had a series of meetings in May to prepare for the racing

season. They sponsored a ZOOM call, with skippers on the line, to invite members who would like to crew on a boat for Wednesday Night Racing and other sessions explaining the rules and procedures of sailboat racing. Our head PRO (Principal Race Officer) has invited club members who would like to help to come aboard either the committee boat or markset boat. It is nice to have a few extra hands to write down times or change the code flags and learn more about racing. Please contact me if you are interested.

The OTB's (Over the Bottom) events are on our calendar, and Greg Barraclough is getting ready to set his courses. For those of you who do not know, these are powerboat events somewhat like automobile "time and distance" rallies. Boats follow instructions about direction and speed, with the winning boat being the one coming closest to the "mark time" set by Greg prior to the event. Along the way, competitors also try to answer challenging puzzles and trivia questions. A total of five OTB's are scheduled during the summer. The overall winner (the skipper coming the closest to the combined mark time for their best three participations) must throw a party for the participants the next year. It is a great way to spend a Saturday morning on the lake.

For the time being we are unsure about coming back to the club freely after the above events due to COVID restrictions. Time will tell as California guidance evolves —stay tuned!

We have a few new staff members helping during events. Jenna Hendricks and Amie Andres have done a great job on our First Fridays, Casual Fridays, and other events at the club. They are polite, enthusiastic, and work very well with our Bar Manager, Cynthia Lewis, and with me.

I would like to thank Moe's BBQ downstairs for being so accommodating, providing food service for us during this time when alcoholic beverages could only be served as part of a meal transaction. They have made it possible for us to stay open during this COVID timeframe. It has been a good relationship, one that I think we will continue in the future, even as the requirement for food with bar service is eliminated. I look forward to welcoming everyone to the clubhouse and to having a great time out on the water!



Treasurer Report

s COVID-19 restrictions continue to affect club operations, you should feel assured that the club is well-positioned to weather this storm. Through years of good fiscal management, the club has close to \$600,000 in cash assets spread out over low-risk money market and CD accounts. If this sounds familiar, it should: it was included in the Treasurer's Report from the previous B & T issue. I think it's important to restate these facts to help instill confidence in just how financially strong your club is today.

We collect the lion's share of our revenue from annual club dues during the month of January, and this year has been no exception. As we continue to see an increase in new membership, even in this pandemic period, the renewal trend has been very promising as we are realizing fewer "quits" than we had anticipated.

While there have been relatively few changes from the 2020 budget, one highlight was the allocation of up to \$38,000 in reserve funds to be used for the bar renovation project. As mentioned in the Rear Commodore report, the bar renovation has been completed and was under budget. This investment in our bar will serve the membership well for many years to come.

We want to thank you again for your continued support and eagerly look forward to the upcoming year. Please remember to notify the club anytime the credit card information we have for your account on file changes. Cheers!





With summer approaching, it is time to store our skis and boots and retrieve our summer activity equipment – hiking boots, golf clubs, tennis/pickleball equipment, kayaks, paddleboards and bicycles – and put a range of TYC summer activities on our schedules. The Lake Tahoe basin is a wonderland for the summer outdoor enthusiast, and TYC schedules

events for many interests. For all these activities, check the TYC on-line calendar for dates, and watch the weekly member newsletters for details as these events draw near. Most groups schedule outings about every two weeks. All you need to do is RSVP to the activity leaders to join in the fun and adventure.



Eagles Golf

The Eagles are our group with the longest tradition. Eagles outings are scheduled about every two weeks

throughout the summer, playing on a selection of North Tahoe courses, with Old Brockway GC in Kings Beach a particular favorite.



Spokes Cycling

The Spokes enjoy a wide selection of Tahoe Basin rides on quality, mostly paved trails (no hard-core

single tracking or rutted Jeep roads). Routes typically range from 15 to 25 miles with flat to modest grades. Most participants now seem to ride e-bikes, but routes are very doable for those on conventional bikes.



Hoofers Hiking

The Hoofers hike trails all around the Tahoe Basin, many around the lake and others as far south as the

Carson Pass area and as far northwest as the Gold Lakes basin. Some outings in particularly interesting areas are docent-led. All offer wonderful views and captivating experiences in the Sierra wonderland.



Paddle Dippers

This summer, enjoy calm morning excursions on the lake with your kayak or paddleboard. Or use

one of those owned by TYC, available for checkout from Andrew. A variety of launch locations are scheduled along the west, north, and east shores, so that participants can experience the many lovely paddling locations the Lake offers.



Tennis/Pickleball

New this summer! Several pickleball events are planned, using courts at Tahoe City area locations.

Bocce

In years past, local restaurant Wolfdale's has traditionally organized a competition series for local bocce teams, with TYC

always participating. Due to COVID restrictions, Wolfdale's has, for the second summer, converted their courts to outdoor dining use. There may be options for TYC to roll-our-own occasional bocce events, but currently nothing specific is scheduled. Stay tuned!

Laser Start

Under Sail

Thope you have all survived the lockdowns and socially distanced winter and are ready to get out and play on the lake again. I know I am. TYC did a very admirable job last summer given all the COVID concerns, and it turned out to be a fantastic summer of great sailing. Hopefully we can duplicate those efforts again this year. The lake level is lower, but we will make the best of it. Here is our tentative schedule for sailing this year:

LASER RACING - MAY 31-AUGUST 30

Kicking off the season as usual is the Monday night Laser Series. Races begin at 6 PM for 14 consecutive Monday nights. Our grand finale is the "TYC Laser Fleet Championships" set for September 10-12 at Stampede Reservoir north of Truckee. This regatta is one of the largest Laser regattas in California. More than 40 boats will likely make the line, attracting some top talent on the West Coast.

Laser sailing is a fantastic spectator sport. The windward and leeward marks are premium viewing locations, where you will see tactical and skillful boat maneuvering by the sailors. We invite you to come out and watch the racing this summer.

The Spring and Summer Series are seven weeks each. We have three coed fleets racing each week - Laser "A," "B," and "C" fleets. The "C" fleet is our Junior fleet, racing in the smaller Laser "Pico" boats. The Laser "A" and "B" fleets can be sailed with the Standard sail or smaller

and more manageable Radial sail. The sailors make that decision at the dock. If you have some basic boat handling skills and want to come out to play, the "B" fleet is a great way to get involved.

Since 1996 and through at least 2024, the Laser has been chosen as the Olympic Class Single-Handed boat. The men race with the Standard sail and the women race with the Radial sail. The Laser sailboat is currently the largest one-design fleet in the world.

A big thank you goes out to our awesome and committed Principal Race Officer (PRO) crew consisting of Mike Simmons, John Sakrison, and Fred and Linda Greifenstein, along with other volunteers. If you have an interest in volunteering to be part of the PRO crew, please reach out to Andrew at the club. It is a great way to have some fun on the water and support our sailing programs. We have an excellent training program, thanks to TYC member John Seigel who serves as a national PRO judge for the US Sailing Association (USSA).

Buddy Boat Program: As a member benefit, you can go sailing "For Free" with one of our Buddy Boats. The TYC has three Lasers, two Sunfishes, and one Laser Pico. The Pico is easy to sail and is perfect for the novice/intermediate and adult/child or two-up adult sailing. The Sunfish is for the low intermediate/advanced sailor, and the Laser is for the advanced/expert sailor. You can check out the sail bags at the clubhouse. Thank you to our TYC members that have donated boats!

TRANS TAHOE JULY 9 - 11

The Trans Tahoe Regatta is over 50 years old and has been one of TYC's main sailing events during its tenure. The format this year will be the same as last year: a two-day event with buoy racing on Friday and long-distance racing on Saturday. We are reserving Sunday as well, as a make-up day in case of poor wind conditions on a previous day. Last year we moved the dates

into mid-July, and it proved to be a great idea as we were treated with more favorable conditions for the event. We invite you to boat out to watch some great racing and cheer on your favorites. There will be at least three different divisions racing this year.

WEDNESDAY NIGHT RACING SERIES JUNE 2 - SEPTEMBER 1

The Wednesday Night Racing Series (previously known as Wednesday Night Beer Can Series) is one of our most popular sailboat racing activities. Like the Lasers, there will be both the spring and summer race series with seven nights of racing per series. There are currently three

boat classes. Division One consists of the biggest and fastest boats we have, typically in the 35 to 40-foot range. Division Two is for medium-fast boats with PHRF ratings (handicaps to level the playing field) between 57 and 96. This is a sport boat division with boats in the 24 to 33-foot range. Division Three is our largest division, consisting of boats with PHRF ratings of 97 or more. Wednesday evenings are all about good times and competitive fun on and off the water. There are not much better times than sailing on Lake Tahoe on a summer afternoon where the surroundings are peaceful but the competition is not!

GARWOOD'S REGATTA - JULY 31

The Garwoods Regatta is scheduled for Saturday, July 31st. This is one of my favorite sailing events. The course shape and location are not like anything else we offer. We have been running an

"L" shaped course that starts at Garwoods then goes to Kings Beach then up to Dollar Point then back to Kings Beach and then finishes in front of Garwoods. It is really fun racing in the mostly unfamiliar territory of Carnelian Bay. Look for us racing in front of Garwoods that day. The start and finish lines are directly in front of the restaurant. Afterwards there is an awards gathering at Garwoods, and if you are inclined to hold down

a table or two for the racers while they locate buoys and venture in, you will surely be a hero and likely recipient of a free Wet Woody!



Tahoe Yacht Club Foundation 2021 Concours d' Elegance POSTPONED

he Board of the TYC Foundation made the difficult decision in late April to postpone holding the in-water Concours until August of 2022. The number one concern of the TYC Foundation and Obexer's Boat Company is the health and safety of attendees, staff, volunteers, and the entire Lake Tahoe community. At this time, there are too many unknowns surrounding the pandemic in the state of California. After a lot of research



and many heartfelt conversations with Obexer's Marina, as well as key stakeholders and vendors of the show, the Foundation determined it is in the best interest of all involved to postpone Concours until next summer.

The Concours is the primary source of funds that provide the Foundation with the means to support various sailing and boating non-profits around Lake Tahoe. Missing two summer shows in a row will significantly hamper, if not eliminate the Foundation's ability to fund several worthy organizations this year such as the Tahoe Community Sailing Foundation.

In order to continue to support our Lake community and to maintain interest in the Concours for next year's show, the Foundation will once again hold a Virtual Lake Tahoe Concours d'Elegance this summer. Set to launch this June, the virtual show allows us to increase the awareness of



the show and its mission and broaden the reach of the show to classic boat owners and enthusiasts all over the world. Last year's virtual show had 50 entries including several from Europe. Well over 1,000 votes for Best of Show were cast, indicating that interest in show participation is high and we hope to expand participation further this year. We are also considering another potential fund raiser during Wooden Boat Week in August to provide an opportunity for broader TYC member participation in the club's Foundation mission. We will release more details on the virtual show soon and hope you will join us in our cause.

The Foundation is looking forward to August 12-13 next year and producing a boat show at the caliber you've come to expect from the Lake Tahoe Concours d'Elegance. The show will return to the historic Obexer's Boat Company in 2022 with a celebration of the biggest name in classic boating, Chris-Craft. 2022 marks the 100th anniversary of the Chris-Craft name and Chris-Craft production. Six decades of antique and classic Chris-Crafts will be featured from 1922 through the early 1970s. We expect it to be among the largest Marque Classes in Concours history! 1

RECREATIONAL BOATERS OF CALIFORNIA (RBOC)

PICYI created Recreational Boaters of California (RBOC) in 1968 as a governmental advocacy organization representing California boaters, committed to promoting the enjoyment, protection, and responsible use of our waterways. RBOC continues to work a number of issues with importance to the recreational boating community; these currently include:

THE GOVERNOR'S BUDGET PROPOSAL OF A 250% BOAT REGISTRATION FEE INCREASE

California boaters will see their boat registration fees increase from a minimum of \$20 every two years to at least \$70 every two years as soon as July 1 if Governor Gavin Newsom's state budget proposal is enacted. Budget subcommittees in the state Senate and Assembly are discussing this proposal now, and are anticipated to decide on the issue in the near future.

MAKE YOUR VOICE HEARD!

RBOC urges you to contact your state Senator and Assembly Member and request this proposal be revised to ensure boater taxes go to their intended purposes.

CALIFORNIA VESSEL OPERATOR CARD

As a reminder, as of January 1, 2021, California boaters 40 years of age or younger must have a California Vessel Operator Card (CVOC). Requirements for other age groups will be phased in as follows:

- January 1, 2022 Persons 45 years of age or younger
- January 1, 2023 Persons 50 years of age or younger
- January 1, 2024 Persons 60 years of age or younger
- January 1, 2025 All persons regardless of age

The BoatUS Foundation provides a free on-line Boating Safety Course approved by the California State Parks Division of Boating and Waterways that provides the certificate required by California to obtain a CVOC.



SUPPORT TO PICYA & RBOC PROGRAMS

Each year TYC members contribute add-on amounts designated for RBOC when renewing their membership. This year, our membership donated \$1,185. Commodore Krivan recently received a Certificate of Appreciation, presented to the members of the Tahoe Yacht Club, for their generous support in 2020.

s members of the Tahoe Yacht Club, we see the landscapes of Tahoe from a unique perspective: the water. What a joy to be able to clamber into our boats and paddle, sail, or motor out to the center of Lake Tahoe! From our aquatic islands, it is hard not to feel anything but awestruck by the extraordinary natural beauty that surrounds us. But beyond the lake, there

is so much more! Last summer, our hiking group, the Hoofers, explored areas we never knew existed, places of hidden and unexperienced beauty.

The spectacular landscapes that define Lake Tahoe are more than a lovely backdrop for our day-to-day lives. Nature – for all its distracting beauty – is nothing less than the life support system for all life on Earth. Wetlands and meadows store and filter our water, forests take in carbon dioxide and produce the oxygen we breathe, bees, moths, and birds pollinate our crops. The rest of the web of Sierra life – shuffling bears, soaring raptors, scampering squirrels, inquisitive jays, down to microorganisms too small to see – all contribute to the environment we love.

And that's why I want to highlight an organization that has been working quietly and behind the scenes to conserve the extraordinary landscapes of our region: the Northern Sierra Partnership. Dreamed up over a kitchen table, the Partnership is

an improbable enterprise: a day-to-day collaboration of five independent, non-profit organizations working together to conserve and restore large, connected landscapes across the northern Sierra. The Partnership, led by President Lucy Blake, takes over where the Tahoe Fund leaves off, pro-

tecting almost 100,000 acres since its launch in 2007, an area more than three times the size of the City of San Francisco.

The five groups that make up the Partnership are global, national, regional, and local: The Nature Conservancy, The Trust for Public Land, the Sierra Business Council, the Truckee Donner Land Trust, and the

Feather River Land Trust. Together they work to protect and restore natural areas from Carson Pass to Lassen National Park, a five million acre-region that supplies much of the water that sustains our thirsty state.

It might be helpful to name some of the incredible places the Part-

nership has protected. Spoiler alert: you may not have heard of them, and here's why. Until recently, these places were private property and mostly off limits to you and me. They are some of the most extraordinary natural areas outside the Tahoe Basin: Waddell Ranch (protected in 2007), Perrazzo Meadows (2009), Independence Lake (2010), Mt. Lola (2010), Royal Gorge (2012), Webber Lake/Lacey Meadows (2012), American River Headwaters (2015), the Sierra Valley Preserve (2016), Carpenter Valley (2017), and Frog Lake (2020).

Thanks to the NSP, the Hoofers last summer explored Independence Lake and Carpenter Valley (with Lucy as our docent); and this season, Frog Lake is on the Hoofer schedule. Our kayakers would thoroughly enjoy a day on Independence or Webber Lakes.

The Partnership's work is not done. They are currently revving up for another five to seven years of high-impact conservation. To find out more about their work and how you might support that work (as Terry and I, and others among our membership have for some years), go to https://northernsierrapartnership.squarespace.com.

To visit some of these wonderful places, check out the maps on NSP's website or contact our Chief Hoofer, Nancy Taylor, and plan to participate in some of the Hoofer outings this summer. Either way, you are in for a treat.

Clean Up the Lake

Clean up The Lake (CUTL) Founder Colin West and his team of certified divers have been working on underwater cleanup around Lake Tahoe. We have been discussing a partnership whereby our TYC mem-

bers will volunteer to be Captain for a Dive, where our boat captains will provide on-the-water support for dive teams. As you can imagine, underwater cleanup is quite an undertaking, but what is more impressive is that CUTL has pledged to circumnavigate the lake before the

end of 2021. We are taking sign-ups for TYC Captains now and will have an informational presentation to answer all your questions before we embark upon this program. 

After reading *Western Wood*, our award-winning quarterly magazine, you may wish to purchase a boat listed in the Trading Dock portion of the magazine or one on the classified page on the ACBS website.

Just how old does a boat need to be to be considered a classic boat?

Historic: A boat built up to and including 1918. Antique: A boat built between 1919 and 1942. Classic: A boat built between 1943 and 1975. Late Classic: A boat built 1976 to the year 25 prior to the current year.

Contemporary: A wooden boat built within the last 25 years.

My boat is old enough to be a classic, but it is fiberglass or aluminum. Is that a problem?

No, as long as your boat is over 25 years old it qualifies as a classic boat. Actually, fiberglass and aluminum boats are a rapidly growing source of members in the ACBS community. Both are relatively inexpensive and offer both challenges and benefits to their owners. No matter what your boat, you will always find members who share your particular interest.

REMEMBERING BILL RUTH

Bill Ruth, 82, of Piedmont, California, we believe to be the longest serving judge at the Concours and long-time ACBS member, passed away just before St. Patrick's Day this year on March 15th.

We can remember Bill for his calm, knowledgeable approach to the judging system and for his smile and friendship.

Bill was born in Newport, RI during a hurricane. He grew up as an army brat, as his father was an Army Colonel. Bill had lived in Virginia, Boston, Tokyo and finally in Piedmont, California. He was on the track team and started working on cars in his teens, then after college, working on boats. He was accepted at Cal and Stanford, and chose Cal because he could walk to the Cal Campus in Berkeley and it was much more affordable to the family. He served in Vietnam as a lieutenant for four years. He captained a Swift Boat, patrolling narrow rivers and canals. Bill had a long career in waterfront development, including Pier 39, Marina Bay, Richmond, CA and the Port of Stockton, Calif. Bill served on the California Marine Parks and Harbors Association. He owned several boats, including a 1955 Besotes "Hell-za-Poppin". He also was an avid sailor and raced in 1969 in the Bermuda Cup aboard Primm of Chestertown, MD.

Leading Lady

Since its founding in 1925 on the shores of Lake Tahoe, the Tahoe Yacht Club has enjoyed over 100 years of pleasure boating. Starting with the first boat race in 1910 at Tahoe City, boat owners have enjoyed racing, riding in, and showing their boats. Tahoe Yacht Club and the Antique & Classic Boat Society share this rich history together. We have 47 members who share both organizations here on Lake Tahoe. With that, we thought we would look back a little and present some member boat profiles from some of the ACBS boat shows. Enjoy!

Leading Lady – Terry & Carol Clapham of Jamestown, CA and Crystal Bay, NV (with daughter Lyn Holstead as crew) entered a 1940 Gar Wood, 24' 6" Custom Utility in the 2016 South Tahoe Wooden boat Classic.

Leading Lady was built especially to be displayed at the 1940 National Motor Boat Show in New York City. It would be the centerpiece of the Gar Wood display and the only twin-engine

Gar Wood that the company ever displayed at the New York show. It was painted white, the first time Gar Wood had introduced a painted hull. Boating magazines reported that the 1940 Gar Wood display was the largest and most successful in their long history. One of the early visitors to the show was Frank Durkee Jr., whose family owned a chain of movie theaters in Maryland; he was in New York to see the opening of "Gone With the Wind." At the Gar Wood display, he made his choice and purchased a Model 198, the largest of the Gar Wood open utilities, naming it Florence after his mother. Although Gar Wood built five models of this design between 1937 and 1942, only two twin-engine utilities are thought to survive, one being the former Florence. Originally powered by a pair of Chrysler Crown M2's (103HP), the boat sank in Chesapeake Bay in the 70s. At the time, the boat had been painted black and was called Jackle. The owner did not pay the marina for a salvage, so the marina sold the engines to recover their cost. At this point, fifth owner Tony Mollica, founder and president of the Gar Wood Society, discovered the boat in the spring of 1979 and renamed her Leading Lady in recognition of Vivien Leigh's roll in "Gone With the Wind." He had her restored, stripping and then varnishing the hull, and installed a pair of Kermath engines. Former Tahoe Yacht Club Commodore, Paul Walker, acquired Leading Lady in 1991 from Tony and brought hull #6451 to the mile-high waters of Lake Tahoe. Paul had Tony Brown of Western Runabouts do a complete restoration in the 90s; Sierra Boat Company located a matched pair of Chrysler Crown M47 engines (115 HP each) and installed them in the boat. Terry & Carol Clapham, the 7th owners of Leading Lady, acquired the boat from Paul Walker in 2011. The ACBS South Tahoe Classic Boat Show and Lake Tahoe Concours d'Elegance multiple award winner is maintained by Sierra Boat Company.

Leading Lady is the "cover girl" for Mollica's definitive book, Gar Wood Boats, Classics of a Golden Era, the "calendar girl" for Classic Boating's 2003 Classic Motorboats calendar, and a star of

Maryland Public Television's "Boatworks" which was hosted by television star Robert Urich. She is also shown in the May/June issue of *Classic Boat Magazine*. **1**
